IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

Resolve, to Establish the Commission on Maine's Food Policy.

Common State Commo

- Preamble. Whereas, the Legislature, by Resolve 1983, chapter 51, created a food policy for Maine which sought to establish and encourage increased food production and distribution practices designed to ensure a safe, wholesome, nutritious and adequate food supply for the citizens of the State. Since the adoption of the food policy resolve, many conditions and circumstances have changed and the policy therefore requires periodic review and modification as well as a formal organization to promote the implementation of the policy; now, therefore, be it
- Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission on Maine's Food Policy is established which shall monitor the implementation of the State's food policy, make recommendations to the Legislature and public organizations involved in food issues and periodically review the food policy and make recommendations concerning the need for modifications to the Legislature; and be it further
 - Sec. 2. Membership; structure; terms. Resolved: That the commission shall consist of 13 members as follows.
 - 1. The following shall serve as ex officio members:
- A. The Commission of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources;
- B. The Director of the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station;
- C. One member of the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture to be designated by that committee; and
- D. The Commissioner of Marine Resources.

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- 2. The President of the Senate shall appoint one member with knowledge of and experience with marketing issues; one member with knowledge of and experience with nutrition and health issues; and one member with knowledge of and experience in farm and rural economics, rural development and agricultural finance.
 - 3. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint one member with knowledge of and experience in the area of rural community needs, local support structures and land use issues; one member with knowledge of and experience with consumer issues; and one member with knowledge of and experience with agricultural issues.
- 4. The Governor shall appoint 3 members representing the various areas of knowledge and experience set out in subsections 2 and 3.
- 31 ---- 5. A chair shall be selected by the entire commission from

the group of appointed members. No ex officio member may be eligible to serve as chair except that, until the chair selected, the member from the Joint Standing Committee Agriculture shall serve as chair pro tempore.

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- Terms of office for appointed members shall be for 3 years except that, for the initial appointed members, one of the members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one of the members appointed by the President of the Senate and one of the members appointed by the Governor shall serve for terms of one year; and be it further
- Sec. 3. Duties. Resolved: That the commission may create subcommittees for the purpose of examining particular issues. The commission shall be responsible for monitoring the progress and implementing the State's food policy, as currently stated in Resolve 1983, chapter 51, and as modified from time to time by hold hearings Legislature. The commission shall and solicit public input as conferences, undertake studies necessary to enable the commission to make recommendations concerning long-term directions and goals in the area of food The commission make recommendations policy. shall also concerning improved means of communication, enabling better implementation of the food policy and may undertake such actions as it determines necessary to increase public awareness of food production and food policy issues. The commission shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture which must contain a review of the commission's activities for the year as well as any recommendations to the for changes to the State's food policy recommendations for the enactment or modification of state laws; and be it further

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Sec. 4. Final report. Resolved: That the commission shall submit including any necessary report, implementing legislation, to the 115th Legislature by January 1, 1992; and be it further

Sec. 5. Staff. Resolved: That staff shall be supplied by the 39 Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural additional support shall be furnished by the State Planning 41

Office; and be it further

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- Sec. 6. Compensation. Resolved: That the legislative members of the commission shall receive the legislative per diem and all other members shall receive reimbursement for expenses only; and be it further
- Sec. 7. Funding. Resolved: 49 That the Commission on Maine's Food Policy may accept revenues from any source and may use any such revenues to carry out the purposes of this resolve. 51

STATEMENT OF FACT

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This resolve establishes the Commission on Maine's Food Policy to monitor the State's food policy as articulated in Resolve 1983, chapter 51; to make recommendations to the Legislature and public organizations involved in food issues; and to periodically review and make recommendations concerning changes to the state food policy. The commission shall submit its final report by January 1, 1992.

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
