46	The Maine Health Care Finance Commission has had authority
48	to collect hospital outpatient data, to the extent needed for
50	regulatory purposes, since it was created in 1983. Public Law 1989, chapter 565, section 5, however, mandated the collection of

language refers to 1991 rather than 1990. This could have the unintended effect of delaying hospital outpatient data collection for another year, at the very time that Public Law 1989, chapter 588, directs the commission to study outpatient regulation and implement a new system of regulating rates for outpatient services by 1992. This bill prevents delay in collecting hospital data by changing the implementation date from 1991 to 1990.

In Public Law 1989, chapter 565, section 6, the commission was also directed to collect data on certain outpatient surgery performed outside of hospitals, beginning in 1990. The appropriation in chapter 565 only provide funds for needed equipment and operating expenses for the latter half of the 1990-91 fiscal year. This effectively delays collection of nonhospital data, essential for a full understanding of trends in hospital care, until 1991.

Section 2 of this bill allows the 1990 statutory date to be honored by appropriating the additional amounts needed.
