

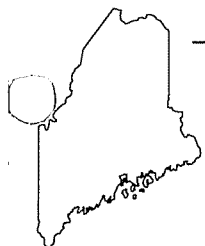
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IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD  
NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETY

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An Act Relating to Services to Infants and Young Children, Ages 0 through 5,  
Who Are Handicapped or at Risk for Developmental Delay.

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Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA §7710, sub-§§13 and 14, as enacted by PL 1989, c. 499, §9, are amended to read:

13. **Acquire property.** Acquire by purchase, gift, lease or rent any property, lands, buildings, structures, facilities or equipment necessary to fulfill the purposes of this chapter; and

14. **Other duties.** Fulfill other duties assigned by the Legislature, and to delegate duties and authority, but not responsibility, as necessary for the efficient operation of this chapter, and to do any other acts or things necessary or convenient to carry out the powers expressly granted or reasonably implied in this chapter; and

Sec. 2. 20-A MRSA §7710, sub-§15 is enacted to read:

15. Dissemination of information. The United States Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, Public Law 93-380, as amended by Public Law 93-568, and the United States Education of All Handicapped Children Act, Public Law 94-142, governs the dissemination of information about infants and children, ages 0 through 5, who are handicapped or at risk for developmental delay.

**STATEMENT OF FACT**

This bill clarifies the obligation of the Child Development Services System to comply with federal provisions regarding personally identifiable information.
