Resolve, to Create the Maine Commission on Environmental Policy.



Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Maine Commission on Environmental Policy is established; and be it further

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- Sec. 2. Commission membership; chair. Resolved: commission consists of the following 13 members:
- Three members appointed by the President of the Senate, 8 not more than one of whom may be a Legislator, and not more than 10 one of whom may be employed by the State;
- 2. Three members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 12 Representatives, not more than one of whom may be a Legislator, and not more than one of whom may be employed by the State; 14
- 16 Six members appointed by the Governor, not more than one of whom may be a Legislator, and not more than one of whom may be 18 employed by the State; and
 - 4. One member appointed by the other 12 commission members who shall serve as the chair; and be it further

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Appointments; meetings. Sec. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council must be notified by the Governor, and Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President of Senate, when the selections have been made. The Chair of Legislative Council shall call the first meeting of commission, at which time, the commission may appoint the 13th and final commission member; and be it further

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Sec. 4. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall undertake a study of existing state environmental policies with a primary goal of consolidating and updating those policies into a comprehensive body of policy that recognizes the cumulative effects of changes to the environment and the impact of those changes on the quality of life and defines minimum standards for responsible individual, governmental and corporate activity. part of the study, the commission shall:

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Examine the laws administered by the Department of Protection and the Maine Land Use Regulation Environmental Commission, as well as local environmental mandates, as they create and affect environmental policy;

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2. Develop a plan that unifies environmental policy making and planning functions within state agencies and separates those functions from regulatory and enforcement functions;

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Recommend a plan that facilitates separate planning and permits review functions at the local level;

- 2 4. Propose methods by which environmental policies are made more explicit;
 - 5. Examine ways of aligning environmental decision-making boundaries with watersheds and ecological systems, and avoiding sources of nonpoint source pollution;

Evaluate the carrying capacities of such limits to
 growth as water, waste, transportation and other environmental systems;

7. Examine the impact on the quality of life of environmental issues such as open space, the protection of local and regional visual landscapes and the social coherence of established neighborhoods, communities and institutions; and

8. Evaluate methods to integrate, on a consistent basis, the values of the people of this State into the formulation of environmental policy.

In the performance of its duties, the commission may hold public hearings and conferences with any person, persons, organizations or governmental agencies. The commission shall be provided information, reports or other assistance from any agency, department, legislative committee or other instrumentality of the State, with the consent of the head of the respective organization. State agencies shall, upon request, assist the commission in carrying out the purposes of this resolve; and be it further

- Sec. 5. Report. Resolved: That the commission shall submit its report, together with any enabling legislation to the Legislature by December 1, 1991; and be it further
- Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the commission may contract with a research assistant to provide professional services as primary staff. The chair of the commission shall manage the research assistant's work. The research assistant shall provide clerical assistance and prepare any legislation recommended by the commission; and be it further

Sec. 7. Reimbursement. Resolved: That the members of the commission who are Legislators are entitled to receive the legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, for days of attendance at commission meetings. All members of the commission who are not state employees receive expenses, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 12002, upon application to the Executive Director of the Legislative Council for those expenses; and be it further

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Sec. 8. Appropriation. Resolved: That the following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of 2 this resolve. 4 1990-91 6 ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION. 8 DEPARTMENT OF 10 Maine Commission on Environmental Policy 12 Personal Services \$1,980 All Other 44,350 14 Provides funds for the per diem, travel and related expenses of the Maine Commission on 16 Environmental Policy. This resolve establishes the Maine 30 Commission on Environmental Policy. The commission will study 32 and consolidate existing state environmental policies into a comprehensive body of policy that recognizes the cumulative effects of changes to the environment on Maine's quality of life, 34 minimum standards for responsible individual, 36 governmental and corporate activity, and incorporates, on a continuing basis, the environmental policy values of the people

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of Maine.
