An Act to Establish a System to Provide Continuous Telecommunications Relay Services for Deaf, Hearing Impaired or Speech Impaired Persons Who Must Rely on Teletypewriter Equipment for Telecommunications.

24	telephone <u>telecommunications</u> relay services for deaf and, hearing impaired <u>and speech impaired</u> persons who must rely on

38	1. Money for telecommunication typewriters. The Bureau of Rehabilitation within the Department of Human Services, pursuant
40	to any appropriation of money to the bureau for telecommunication typewriters for the deaf, hearing impaired and speech impaired,
42	shall, upon request, provide up to 50% of the cost of telecommunication typewriters to any organization or municipality

48	2. Telecommunications Equipment Fund. A Telecommunications Equipment Fund is established. The Division of Deafness in the
50	Bureau of Rehabilitation may accept any gifts or grants for the

purchase, lease, upgrading, installation, maintenance and repair of special telecommunications equipment for the deaf, hearing impaired or speech impaired. The Division of Deafness under the Bureau of Rehabilitation may draw on the fund in accordance with the Telecommunications Equipment Plan required under subsection 3.

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- Telecommunications Equipment Plan. 3. The Division of Deafness shall develop a plan to make special telecommunications equipment available to deaf, hearing impaired and speech impaired persons and to distribute money from the Telecommunications Equipment Fund. The plan shall must be developed by the Division of Deafness annually, not later than January 1st, in accordance with the rule-making procedures in Title 5, chapter 375. plan shall-previde provides for the expenditure of money from the fund for the benefit of deaf, hearing impaired and speech impaired persons for the purchase, lease, upgrading, installation, maintenance and repair οf special telecommunications equipment capable of serving their needs. Persons who are profoundly deaf or speech impaired so that they eannet are unable to use the telephone for expressive or receptive communications, as verified by a written report from an otologist, audiologist or physician, are eligible assistance from the fund. The plan shall must include specific criteria that will--govern governs the priorities assigned to various persons who need this equipment. The criteria shall-take takes into account household income, degree of impairment, need for emergency communications, living arrangements and other factors deemed determined relevant by the Division of Deafness.

- 1. Telecommunications relay services. Telecommunications relay services administered by the Division of Deafness must conform to the following requirements:
  - A. Services must be available on a statewide basis;
- B. Services must be available 24 hours a day;
- 42 <u>C. Relay service communications must be considered confidential;</u>

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- D. Upon request, the provider of the telecommunications relay services shall make known to users of the services any restrictions on the type of calls handled such as collect calls and automated information services; and

2. Contract for telecommunications relay services. The 2 Division of Deafness shall contract to establish continuous 4 statewide telecommunications relay services. The contract must be for a term of 2 years and must, to the extent possible, provide for implementation of a continuous statewide б telecommunications relay service on or before January 1, 1991. 8 Review of contract. Eighteen months after the implementation of continuous statewide telecommunications relay 10 services, the Division of Deafness shall submit a report to the joint standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction 12 over human resource and utility matters. The report must address 14 the following topics: 16 A. Status of the existing telecommunications relay services in this State; 18 B. Alternative telecommunications relay services options 20 including estimates for costs and implementation dates; and 22 C. Recommendations and suggested legislation for long-term implementation of telecommunications relay services in this 24 State. 4. Advisory board. The Telecommunications Relay Services 26 Advisory Board is created within the Division of Deafness. The 28 board consists of 9 members approved by the Director of the Division of Deafness. The members must include the Director of 30 the Division of Deafness or a designee, the Chair of the Advisory Committee to the Division of Deafness created pursuant to section 32 3074 or a designee, one member from a statewide association for the deaf, one member from a center on deafness, one member from the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf, one member from a 34 volunteer organization, one member from a telephone company serving Maine, one member of a telephone association in this 36 State and one member from the Office of the Public Advocate. The Public Utilities Commission shall provide technical assistance 38 through the appointment by its chair of one or more nonvoting 40 technical advisors to the advisory board. Members of the advisory board are entitled to be compensated according to Title 42 5, chapter 379. 44 The Director of the Division of Deafness shall appoint from the advisory board, a chair to serve for a term not to exceed 2 years. A vice-chair may be appointed to serve as acting chair in 46 the absence of the chair. The board shall meet at the call of the chair but not less than 4 times during the calendar year. 48

The chair may delegate, as necessary, duties to members to carry

out the functions of the board.

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	STATEMENT OF FACT
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	This bill:
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	1. Adds 2 new definitions to the Maine Revised Statutes,
34	Title 22, section 3601, subsection 1.
36	2. Modifies section 3601, subsection 2, to require that the
	telecommunications relay system administered by the Division of
38	Deafness be consistent with the provisions set forth in section
	3603.
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	3. Clarifies that section 3602 pertains to telecommunica-
42	tions equipment as distinguished from telecommunications relay
	services which are dealt with in section 3603.

	4. Articulates the features and implementation of a Maine
46	telecommunications relay service by describing the basic features
	of the relay services and directing the Division of Deafness to
48	contract to establish relay services and, to the extent possible,
	implement a relay service on or before January 1, 1991.
50	Additionally, the Division of Deafness is required to evaluate
	the State's relay services 18 months into the term of the
52	contract A Q member advisory board is greated to provide input

to the Division of Deafness on relay service matters. The Director of the Division of Deafness is authorized to establish a user fee to be paid by users of the relay services. The user fee will not apply for the first 60 minutes of each user's monthly usage of the relay services. For use of the relay services for more than 60 minutes in any month the user will be assessed a per minute usage fee for each additional minute. A Telecommunications Relay Service Fund is created.

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10 Appropriates funds to carry out the purposes of this bill. The appropriation section is divided into 2 portions. The first portion relates to the implementation of continuous 12 statewide telecommunications relay services. It provides for the creation of 2 positions in the Division of Deafness to help 14 implement and administer the relay services. 16 appropriates \$475,000, the estimated full annual cost of providing continuous statewide relay services. The 2nd part of the appropriation section is intended to provide funds to 18 maintain the existing limited relay services until the continuous statewide relay services are in place. 20
