IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETY

An Act to Offset Costs of Probation Services.

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	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 17-A MRSA §1204, sub-§1-A, as enacted by PL 1989, c.
4	875, Pt. E, $\S23$ and affected by $\S24$, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:
6	Torrowing enacted in its place.
8	1-A. The court shall attach as a condition of probation that the convicted person pay, through the Division of Probation and Parole, a supervision fee of at least \$50 but not more than
10	\$500, as determined by the court after considering the following factors:
12	A. The degree of supervision required;
14	B. The duration of the probation period; and
16	<i>D</i> . The duración of the probación period, and
18	<u>C. The financial resources available to the convicted</u> person to pay the fee.
20	<u>All fees collected pursuant to this subsection must be</u> <u>transferred to the Probation Resources Fund established in Title</u>
22	34-A, section 1212, to offset the costs of probation.
24	Sec. 2. 34-A MRSA §1212 is enacted to read:
26	<u>§1212. Probation Resources Fund</u>
28	The Probation Resources Fund is established as a dedicated
30	revenue account within the department for funds received pursuant to Title 17-A, section 1204, subsection 1-A. Funds in this account must be used to offset the costs involved in providing
32	probation services. Funds in this account unexpended at the end of the year do not lapse but must be carried forward into
34	subsequent years.
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38	STATEMENT OF FACT
40	This bill establishes the Probation Resources Fund as a dedicated revenue account within the Department of Corrections to
42	be used to offset the costs involved in providing probation services. Money for the fund is to come from fees of between \$50
44	and \$500 paid by convicted persons as a condition of probation.

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
