An Act to Establish a Fund to Assist Elderly Victims of Fires.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §5106, sub-§2, $\P E$, as amended by PL 1989, c. 329, §16, is further amended to read:

Е. Conducting a continuous evaluation of the 6 impact, quality and value of facilities, programs and services, their administrative adequacy and 8 including capacity. Activities operated by or with the assistance of the State 10 and Federal Governments shall must be evaluated. Activities to be included, but to which the bureau shall is not be limited, are those relating to education, employment and 12 vocational services, income, health, housing, 14 transportation, community, social, rehabilitation, protective services andpublic guardianship or 16 conservatorship for older people and incapacitated anddependent adults and programs such as the supplemental security income program, Medicare, Medicaid, property tax 18 refunds and the setting of standards for the licensing of 20 nursing, intermediate care and boarding homes. Included shall-be are activities as authorized by this and so much of the several Acts and amendments to them enacted by the 22 people of the State, and those authorized by United States 24 Acts and amendments to them such as the:

- (1) Maine Residents Property Tax Program;
- Priority Social Services Act of 1973;

(3) Chapter 470 of the public laws of 1969 creating the State Housing Authority;

б	Sec.2. 22 MRSA §5106-A is enacted to read:
8	<u>§5106-A. Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund</u>
10	1. Establishment. There is established the Elderly Persons
12	Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund.
14	2. Funds. The fund receives money deposited by the Treasurer of State pursuant to Title 36, section 5286. All money
16	deposited in the fund, and the earnings on the money, must remain in the fund to be used for uninsured fire assistance and for
18	necessary associated administrative and personnel costs, and may not be deposited with the General Fund, or any other fund, except
20	as otherwise provided by law.
22	<u>3. Report and allocation. The commissioner shall include a</u> report on the Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund as
24	<u>part of the report submitted to the Governor pursuant to section</u> <u>41. This report must also be submitted to the joint standing</u>
26	<u>committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over insurance</u> matters. The commissioner shall submit a budget for each
28	<u>biennium in accordance with Title 5, sections 1663 to 1666. The</u> <u>State Controller shall authorize expenditures from the fund as</u>
30	allocated by the Legislature.
32	4. Grants. An elderly person may apply to the bureau for a grant of up to \$1,500 to repair or replace necessary household
34	items destroyed or damaged in an uninsured fire in the elderly person's home if the elderly person had a working smoke detector
36	at home at the time of the fire. The bureau may award grants out of the Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund.
38	Sec. 3. 36 MRSA §5286 is enacted to read:
40	<u>§5286. Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund</u>
42	1. Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund. Any
44	taxpayer who when filing a return is entitled to a refund under this Part may designate any part of that refund to be paid into
46	the Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund established in Title 22, section 5106-A. Every individual resident who is
48	entitled to no refund under this Part may contribute to the fund by including with that resident's return sufficient funds to make
50	the contribution. Each individual income tax return form must contain a designation in substantially the following form:

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contribution to Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund:

 2. Contributions credited to Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund. The State Tax Assessor shall determine annually
 the total amount contributed pursuant to subsection 1. Prior to the beginning of the next year, the State Tax Assessor shall
 deduct the cost of administering the fund checkoff, not exceeding \$1,000 annually, and report the remainder to the Treasurer of
 State who shall credit that amount to the fund. Interest earned by contributions in the fund is credited to the fund.

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3. Unexpended funds. All funds on deposit in the fund for 14 3 years and unexpended must be deposited in the General Fund for use in state real property tax relief. 16

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill establishes the Elderly Persons Uninsured Fire Assistance Fund and provides for funding through an income tax checkoff. The fund, which is to be administered by the Bureau of Elder and Adult Services, provides grants of up to \$1,500 to elderly persons to repair or replace necessary household items destroyed or damaged in an uninsured fire in their homes.

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
