An Act to Preserve Maine's Part-time Citizen Legislature by Making the Legislative Process More Efficient and Less Costly to Maine Taxpayers.



#### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 3 MRSA §2, first ¶, as amended by PL 1989, c. 878, Pt. D, §14 and as affected by §15, is further amended to read:

Each member of the Senate and the House of Representatives, beginning with the first Wednesday of December 1990 thereafter, shall-receive-\$10,500 is entitled to \$8,400 in the first year and \$7,500 \$6,000 in the 2nd year of each biennium, and shall-be-paid payment for travel at each legislative session once each week at the same rate per mile to and from that Legislator's place of abode as state employees receive, mileage to be determined by the most reasonable direct route, except that Legislators may be reimbursed for tolls paid for travel on the Maine Turnpike provided they have a receipt for payment of the tolls, such those tolls to be reimbursed when Legislators use the Maine Turnpike in traveling to and from sessions of the Legislature or in performance of duly authorized committee assignments. Each Legislator is entitled to mileage on the first day of the session, and such amounts of salary and expenses at such times as the Legislature may determine during the session, and the balance at the end thereof of the session.

Sec. 2. 3 MRSA §2, 2nd  $\P$ , as amended by PL 1985, c. 166, is further amended to read:

The first regular session of the Legislature, after-itseenvening, shall must adjourn no later than the 3rd 2nd Wednesday in June April and the 2nd regular session of the Legislature shall must adjourn no later than the 3rd first Wednesday in April March. The Legislature, in case of emergency, may by a vote of 2/3 of the members of each House present and voting, extend the date for adjournment for the first or 2nd regular session by no more than 5 legislative days, and in case of further emergency, may by a vote of 2/3 of the members of each House present and voting, further extend the date for adjournment by 5 additional legislative days. The times for adjournment for the first and 2nd regular sessions may also be extended for one additional the considering possible legislative day for purpose of objections of the Governor to any bill or resolution presented to him the Governor by the Legislature under the Constitution of Part Third, Section 2. Article IV, The date for submission of legislation for the first regular session is the first Tuesday after the first Monday in December.

#### Sec. 3. 3 MRSA §5 is enacted to read:

#### §5. Session procedure

Notwithstanding any rule of the Legislature, during any regular session of the Legislature, the Legislature may not hold

daily sessions on Fridays, except that daily sessions may be held on the last 4 Fridays of a regular session. This subsection does not prohibit any joint standing committee of the Legislature from holding a hearing on a Friday.

This bill reduces the salaries of Legislators by 20%, shortens the legislative sessions and prohibits all Friday sessions except during the last 4 Fridays of a regular session.
