An Act to Create Citizen Councils on Unorganized Islands.



Вe	it	enacted	bv	the	Peop	le of	the	State	of	Maine	as	follows

Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §683, first ¶, as amended by PL 1989, c. 503, 4 Pt. B, §55, is further amended to read:

The Maine Land Use Regulation Commission, as established by Title 5, section 12004-D, subsection 1, to carry out the purposes stated in section 681, is created within the Department of Conservation, and in this chapter called the "commission." The commission is charged with implementing this chapter in all of the unorganized and deorganized areas of the State, except unorganized islands subject to subchapter III-A. The commission shall-censist consists of 7 public members, none of whom shall-be are state employees, whe-shall-be appointed by the Governor, subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over natural resources and to confirmation by the Legislature, for staggered 4-year terms. Among the public members, there shall must be 4 who shall-be are knowledgeable in at least one of each of the following areas: Commerce and industry; fisheries and wildlife; forestry; and conservation. Of the potential appointees to the commission, the Governor shall actively seek and give consideration to persons residing in or near the unorganized areas of the State and at least 2 members shall must be residents within the commission's jurisdiction.

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Sec. 2. 12 MRSA c. 206-A, sub-c. III-A is enacted to read:

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SUBCHAPTER III-A UNORGANIZED ISLANDS CITIZEN COUNCILS

§688-A. Applicability

This subchapter applies to any populated and unorganized island that is wholly owned by 3 or more persons. This subchapter does not apply to unpopulated unorganized islands or unorganized islands wholly owned by fewer than 3 persons.

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§688-B. General provisions

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By January 1, 1992, each applicable unorganized island shall form a citizen council to carry out the purposes of this chapter. Each citizen council must have at least 3, but not more than 7, members who are elected by a majority of the residents and landowners of each island. Each member shall serve for 3 years.

A citizen council formed under this subchapter shall carry out all the purposes of this chapter, including the establishment of land use districts and standards, site development review and approval, the enforcement of violations and inspection for compliance to these provisions, the conduct of any public

18	2 prevent the election of a citizen council on an unorganized island, governance of that unorganized island for the purposes of
20	the unorganized land use regulation laws reverts to the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission under this chapter.

30	This bill exempts populated unorganized islands owned by at least 3 people from the jurisdiction of the Maine Land Use
32	Regulation Commission and requires that those islands form a "citizen council" to carry out the purposes of the unorganized
34	land use regulation laws set forth in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, chapter 206-A.
