Whenever a person seeks recovery for a-personal-injury-or preperty death or damage caused by 2 or more persons, the settlement with or release of one or more of the persons causing the injury-shall damage is not be a bar to a subsequent action against the other person or persons also causing the injury damage.

Evidence of settlement with a release of one or more persons causing the injury-shall damage is not be admissible at a subsequent trial against the other person or persons also causing the injury damage. After the jury has returned its verdict, the trial judge shall inquire of the attorneys for the parties whether such a settlement or release has occurred. If such settlement or release has occurred, the trial judge shall reduce the verdict by an amount equal to the settlement with or the consideration for the release of the other persons.

This bill amends the current law regarding release of joint tort-feasors to clear up an ambiguity and to make the terminology consistent with the comparative negligence law.
