Resolve, to Create a Demonstration Program to Increase Utilization of the Food Stamp Program by the Elderly.



Demonstration program. Resolved: That the Department of 2 . Human Services shall seek a waiver from the United States Department of Agriculture to create a demonstration program to 4 provide cash benefits directly to eligible elderly persons in lieu of food coupons. Contingent on such a waiver, the 6 Department of Human Services shall work with elderly consumers or their representatives in the development of this program and report back to the Second Regular Session of the 115th R Legislature by March 15, 1992 on the benefits and problems 10 created by the demonstration program.

The report must include an assessment of whether increased utilization occurred as a result of the demonstration program, the method of benefit distribution, including efficiency and satisfaction and problems of the program identified such as misuse or fraud.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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The Food Stamp Program is a federally funded, state-administered, need-based nutrition program that provides coupons for the purchase of food in accordance with household income and asset limitations. Statistics show that older people under-utilize to a greater extent the Food Stamp Program than do other age groups.

The purpose of this bill is to create a demonstration program, modeled after one in New York, that would provide the food stamp benefit in cash, rather than in coupons. A report would be provided to the Legislature by March 15, 1992 outlining the benefit of this method of distribution, including but not limited to increased utilization, satisfaction with the method of distribution, the efficiency of method and any problems identified such as misuse or fraud.
