An Act Concerning Training and Certification for Land Use Code Enforcement Officers.

10	1. Certification required; exceptions. Beginning January 1, 1993, a municipality may not employ any individual to perform the duties of a <u>land use</u> code enforcement officer who is not
12	certified by the office, except that:
14	A. An individual has 12 months after beginning employment to be trained and certified as provided in this section; and
16	B. Whether or not any extension is available under

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

H. Shoreland zoning.

- 4. Examination. The office shall conduct at least one examination each year to examine candidates for certification ex recertification at a time and place designated by it. The office may conduct additional examinations to carry out the purposes of this subchapter.
- Certification standards. The office shall establish by rule the qualifications, conditions and licensing standards and certification for the and recertification individuals as <u>land use</u> code enforcement officers. A land use code enforcement officer need only be certified in the areas of actual job responsibilities. The rules established under this subsection shall must identify standards for each of the areas of training under subsection 3, in addition to general standards that apply to all land use code enforcement officers, such as administrative and enforcement standards.

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- Certification; terms; revocation. The office shall certify individuals as to their competency to successfully enforce land use ordinances and other land use regulations, and permits granted under those ordinances and regulations, and shall certificates attesting to the competency of individuals to act as land use code enforcement officers. Certificates are valid for 5-years one year unless revoked by the The office shall issue subsequent Administrative Court. certificates on an annual basis to land use code enforcement officers who complete 16 hours of approved training each year.
- A. The Administrative Court may revoke the certificate of a <u>land use</u> code enforcement officer, in accordance with Title 4, chapter 25, when it finds that:
 - (1) The <u>land use</u> code enforcement officer has practiced fraud or deception;
 - (2) Reasonable care, judgment or the application of a duly trained and knowledgeable <u>land use</u> code enforcement officer's ability was not used in the performance of the duties of the office; or
 - (3) The <u>land use</u> code enforcement officer is incompetent or unable to perform properly the duties of the office.

7. Other professions unaffected. This subchapter shall may not be construed to affect or prevent the practice of any other profession.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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This bill makes the following changes to the law governing training and certification for code enforcement officers.

- 1. It changes the term "code enforcement officer" to "land use code enforcement officer" in the Maine Revised Statutes, 16 Title 30-A, section 4451.
- 2. It provides that land use code enforcement officers employed for a minimum of 3 years by municipalities between January 1, 1988 and December 31, 1992 are automatically certified.
- 3. It provides that a continuing education program for individuals engaged in land use code enforcement will be established by the Department of Economic and Community Development, Office of Comprehensive Land Use Planning in cooperation with the Department of Environmental Protection, rather than the Department of Human Services and the Technical College System.
- "shoreland 30 4. It adds zoning" and removes "plumbing inspection," "soils and site evaluation," "electrical 32 inspection," "court techniques" "other and enforcement information" from the list of subjects included in the training 34 program.
- 36 5. It changes the duration of certification validity from 5 years to one year.

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6. It provides for annual recertification for those land use code enforcement officers who complete 16 hours of classroom training each year.
