Resolve, to Establish a Respite Care Demonstration Project.

The rules at a minimum must provide that:

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- 1. The department shall solicit proposals from nursing and boarding homes to set aside and hold open beds for a 2-year period for the purpose of providing respite care. A target of 20 nursing and 10 boarding home beds must be set;
- 18 2. Facilities selected to provide services under project must be distributed as evenly as possible across the State;
- 3. The department shall pay the facilities' current per diem rate for the beds held open; 24
- Facilities will be required to fill these beds with 26 those clients requiring respite care services; and
 - The department, the facilities chosen and area agencies aging will share responsibility for publicizing the availability of the service; and be it further

Sec. 2. Report. Resolved: That the department shall, by December 1, 1993, report to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources the results of the project, including in the report an analysis of utilization of the services by Medicaid eligible clients; the effect, if any, on delaying the need for permanent placement in facilities; and the cost impact on the Medicaid budget.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The bill proposes a 2-year demonstration project in which short-term nursing and boarding home respite care services are made available to Medicaid eligible clients. The Department of Human Services solicits proposals from nursing and boarding homes Under the proposals, the department throughout the State. reimburses the facilities their current rates to hold open 2 beds in each nursing home and one bed in each boarding home selected to participate for respite care clients. The Department of Human

- Services and area agencies on aging are responsible for publicizing the availability of the services. Because occupancy at these facilities is currently very high, this does not result in increased costs to the Medicaid budget.
- At the conclusion of the demonstration, the department shall submit a report to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources.

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
