Resolve, Authorizing the Bureau of Public Improvements to Conduct a Study of All State Work Places.



2 **Study and report required. Resolved:** That the Bureau of Public
3 Improvements shall conduct a comparative study of the work places
4 owned or leased by the State with similar work places in the
5 private sector. The study must include, but is not limited to,
6 the following issues: the use of ergonomically correct
7 equipment; adequate square footage of working space; and basic
8 compliance with health and safety guidelines including correct
9 video display terminal stations and equipment, indoor air quality
10 and adequate lighting and proper internal and external building
11 maintenance. The Bureau of Public Improvements shall report its
12 conclusions on these issues, including any recommended
13 legislation, by January 1, 1992 to the Office of the Executive
14 Director of the Legislative Council for distribution to the Joint
15 Standing Committee on State and Local Government.
