An Act Concerning the Placement of Campaign Signs Along Roads.

23 MRSA \$1913-A, sub-\$1, ¶H, as enacted by PL 1981, c. 318, §3, is amended to read:

H. Signs bearing political messages relating to an election, primary or referendum, provided that these signs may not be placed within the right-of-way prior to 6 weeks before the election, primary or referendum to which they relate and must be removed by the candidate or political committee not later than one week thereafter. These signs may not be placed in any publicly owned right-of-way that abuts residential property.

### STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill amends the billboard law to provide that election campaign signs may not be placed in rights-of-way that abut residential property. This prohibition prevents the clutter that may occur in the right-of-way in front of a person's home and prevents the appearance that a homeowner supports a particular candidate whose sign may be placed in the right-of-way.
