An Act to Increase the Probationary Period for Police Officers.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

30-A MRSA §2701, as amended by PL 1989, c. 104, Pt. C, §§8 4 and 10, is further amended to read:

6 §2701. Employee probation periods

8 Except as specifically provided otherwise by charter or ordinance, any reference to cause and hearing in this Part only
10 applies to an employee who has completed a reasonable probation period established by the municipality. Periods of probation may
12 not exceed 6 calendar months or the length of time in effect in a municipality on January 1, 1984, whichever is greater, except
14 that in the case of police officers, a longer probationary period may be established as the result of collective bargaining.

STATEMENT OF FACT

20 This bill allows municipalities and unions to increase the probationary period for police officers through the collective bargaining process. Current law requires police officers to get 22 formal training at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy. That course lasts 12 weeks. The weeks spent at the Criminal Justice 24 Academy count toward the 6-month probationary period, meaning 26 that a police officer only has 14 weeks of actual duty within the hiring municipality before a final hiring decision has to be made. This bill allows a longer probation period if an agreement 28 on that issue is reached during collective bargaining.
