An Act Concerning the Regulation of Electronic Video Credit Machines by the State Police.



	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

An electronic video credit machine may be played for a minimum of 25¢ and a maximum 34 of \$2 in a single game. The maximum prize awarded may not exceed the value of \$1,000. The payback value of one credit must be at least 80% of the value of the credit. 36 4. Examination of prototypes. The Chief of the State 38 Police and the Attorney General shall examine prototypes of electronic video credit machines and associated equipment of 40 manufacturers seeking a license as required in this chapter. The 42 Chief of the State Police shall require the manufacturer seeking the examination and approval of the electronic video credit 44 machine or associated equipment to pay the anticipated actual cost of the examination before the examination occurs. After the examination occurs, the Chief of the State Police shall refund 46 overpayments or charge and collect amounts sufficient to 48 reimburse the Chief of the State Police for underpayments of

actual cost. The Chief of the State Police may contract for the

examinations of video machines and associated equipment as

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required by this section.

5. Unlicensed machine subject to confiscation. Any machine that is not licensed as required by this section is contraband and a public nuisance and is subject to confiscation by any law enforcement officer.

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### §349-C. Licensing of manufacturer, distributor, wholesaler

- 1. Qualifications. To be licensed as an electronic video credit machine manufacturer, distributor or wholesaler, a person must meet the qualifications set forth in section 349-A. A video machine distributor must also be a resident of the State for at least 2 years before application and at least 50% of the ownership interest in the distributor must be held by individuals who have been residents of the State for at least 2 years before application. Any individual applying for a license, any partner of a partnership, or any officer, director or holder of more than 10% of the ownership interest of a corporation or association applying for a license as a manufacturer, distributor or wholesaler must submit to a background investigation by the Chief of the State Police to verify the applicant's compliance with the requirements of section 349-A.

#### \$349-D. Applications

1. Form. An application for a license required under this chapter must be on the form provided by the Chief of the State Police. The application must be signed by the individual applicant or by a duly authorized officer of the partnership, corporation or association applying for the license. It must contain the full name and address of the applicant, a description of the electronic video credit machine, the location of the premises of the applicant and any other information required by the Chief of the State Police.

2. Notification of municipal officers. An applicant for a license to operate an electronic video credit machine must send a copy of the application to the officers of the municipality in which the machine will be operated. The applicant must certify in the application that the notice has been sent and must list the names and addresses of the persons to whom the notice was sent.

§349-E. Fees; term of license; transferability

3. Location. All records maintained by a licensee must be maintained on the premises where the electronic video credit machine is operated or at the primary business office of the licensee. The primary business office must be designated by the licensee in the license application. All records must be open to inspection by the Chief of the State Police or the chief's representative and a licensee may not refuse the Chief of the State Police or the chief's representative the right to inspect or audit the records. Refusal to permit inspection or audit of the records is not a crime under this chapter, but does constitute grounds for revocation of the license.

	STATEMENT OF FACT
	This bill authorizes the State Police to regulate
coi	n-operated electronic video credit machines that award credits
	eemable for cash. Machines may be placed in establishments
	commence for committee and we braced in escentisimically

holding licenses for the on-premises consumption of liquor. No
more than 3 machines are permitted in a single establishment.
Machines accept coins or bills, with a maximum play of \$2 per
game. Maximum payoff is \$1,000. Machines are required to pay
out in credits at least 80% of the total amount played. Approved
games include poker, keno and blackjack.

Machines are linked by telephone line to a central computer of the State Police for reporting revenue, other data and malfunctions.

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The Treasurer of State receives a share of the net income from the machines after payout of prizes. The State's share begins at 25% and increases to 33.3%. One fourth of the state money is used to increase the funds available to the state for municipal revenue sharing.

Manufacturers, distributors and operators of the machines are required to be licensed by the State Police. Applicants for licenses are subject to background investigations.
