An Act to Promote Comprehensive and Consistent Statewide Environmental Policy and Regulation.



	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §8869, sub-§§8 and 9, as enacted by PL 1989, c.
4	555, §10, are repealed.
6	Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §8869, sub-§12 is enacted to read:
8	12. Exclusive authority. This subchapter is a preemption of the regulation of forest practices by the State.
10	Municipalities may not adopt or enforce ordinances that address forest practices except to the extent municipalities are granted
12	express power to regulate in this area. Any powers granted to municipalities may not allow ordinances to contain requirements

34	STATEMENT OF FACT

38	The purpose of this bill is to ensure uniform statewide policies and rules in the areas of forest practices and pesticide
40	control. This bill prohibits municipalities from adopting or enforcing ordinances that address forest practices or pesticide
	control in the State.
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This bill repeals provisions allowing various forms of municipal ordinances to regulate activities already regulated by the State. The bill further specifies that state law preempts municipal ordinances unless municipalities are expressly granted the power to regulate. This bill accomplishes the objective of uniform state environmental regulation.

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
