An Act to Restore Criminal Sanctions for Failure to Obey Lawful Orders of Harbormasters.

2	Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §12, as repealed and replaced by PL 1989, c.
4	287, §5, is amended to read:

8	Netwithstanding-any-provision-in-this-subchapter Except as provided in section 13, a violation of this subchapter or any

16	\$13. Failure to obey orders of harbormasters
18	1. Offense defined. A person is guilty of failure to obey an order of a harbormaster if the person intentionally, knowingly
20	or recklessly fails to obey any lawful order of a harbormaster authorized pursuant to this subchapter.

28	STATEMENT OF FACT
30	This bill conforms the law on coastal harbormasters to that pertaining to the orders of harbormasters on inland waters in the
32	Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 7803. Most violations of a harbor ordinance will remain civil but whatever deterrent
34	value a civil violation might have is insufficient for an individual who deliberately refuses to obey specific, lawful
36	orders of the harbormaster. This bill makes such conduct subject to criminal penalties as it was in 1989.
