An Act to Revise the Maine Horticultural Laws.

	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 7 MRSA c. 405, as amended, is repealed.
4	Sec. 2. 7 MRSA c. 405-A is enacted to read:
6	CHAPTER 405-A
8	HORTICULTURE
10	<u>§2211. Definitions</u>
12	As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise
14	indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
16	<u>1. Commissioner. "Commissioner" includes a designee of the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources.</u>
18	2. Nursery stock. "Nursery stock" means:
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22	<u>A. Woody plants, including ornamental and fruiting trees, shrubs, vines and all viable parts of these plants;</u>
24	B. Herbaceous plants, including florist stock plants,
26	annuals, perennials, vegetable seedlings, herbs, potted plants and all viable parts of these plants; and
28	C. Any other plant or plant part designated by the commissioner if the regulation is necessary to control any
30	<u>plant pest.</u>
32	"Nursery stock" does not include cut Christmas trees, wreaths, field crops, seeds, dried herbs and flowers and cut flowers.
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-36	3. Nursery. "Nursery" means a place where nursery stock is produced, stored or offered for sale.
38	<b>4. Other materials.</b> "Other materials" means, but is not limited to, material not included in the definition of "nursery
40	stock," such as containers, seeds and cut Christmas trees.
42	5. Plant pest. "Plant pest" means any insect, mite, nematode, fungus, virus, bacteria, slug, snail or any form of
44	aquatic or terrestrial plant or organism that may cause injury to a plant or that the commissioner declares to be a plant pest.
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	<u>6. State Horticulturist. "State Horticulturist" means a</u>
48	<u>person appointed by the commissioner to carry out the duties of this chapter.</u>
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	§2212. Inspection of nurseries

1. Inspection of nurseries. The State Horticulturist or an 2 assistant shall inspect nurseries as determined necessary by the State Horticulturist. Nurseries must be accessible at reasonable 4 times for inspection. If plant pests are found at a level sufficient to pose a threat of the spread of the pest by movement 6 of the nursery stock, the State Horticulturist may issue an order embargoing or detaining the nursery stock. An order issued under 8 this section may not be considered licensing or an adjudicatory proceeding as those terms are defined in the Maine Administrative 10 Procedure Act. The State Horticulturist may prescribe measures 12 designed to control the plant pests. The State Horticulturist shall remove the order of embargo or detention if the State 14 Horticulturist is satisfied that the plant pests have been controlled. A person may not offer for sale:

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A. Nursery stock that is not healthy or will not maintain its vigor:

20 B. Dead nursery stock; or

C. Nursery stock stressed by drying, excessive heat or cold or any other condition limiting plant growth.

#### <u>§2213. Inspection of other material</u>

Other material may be inspected by the State Horticulturist upon request to enable the movement or sale of this material. The commissioner may assess fees to cover the costs associated with these inspections. Funds generated from these fees must be deposited in a nonlapsing account to be used to conduct these inspections.

## 34 <u>§2214.</u> Inspection of orchards, fields and gardens suspected of being infested with plant pests

The State Horticulturist or an assistant may inspect any 38 orchard, field, garden or roadside in public or private grounds if the area is suspected of being infested with a plant pest that 40 may be a threat to the health of plants belonging to other property owners or to the health or safety of the general 42 The State Horticulturist may, after notice and public. opportunity for a hearing is provided in a manner consistent with 44 the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, order the owner, occupant or person in charge to take such action as necessary, including 46 the proper treatment or destruction of any infested or diseased plants. If the owner of the property or a person having lawful 48 custody of the plants does not comply with the written order, the commissioner may refer the matter to the Attorney General who may 50 institute an action to abate the problem.

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<u>§2215. Shipments into the State to be certified</u>

2 All nursery stock shipped into this State from any other state, province or country must bear a certificate on each 4 package stating that the contents were inspected by an authorized inspecting officer and that the contents appear to be free from plant pests. The State Horticulturist or an assistant may 6 inspect, at the point of destination, all nursery stock coming 8 into the State. If such nursery stock is infested with any plant pests, the State Horticulturist, after conferring with the consignor, order that stock destroyed or returned to the 10 consignor at the consignor's expense. The decision of the State 12 Horticulturist to require destruction or return of infested nursery stock may not be considered licensing or an adjudicatory proceeding as defined by the Maine Administrative Procedure Act. 14

16 <u>§2216. Transportation of uninspected stock forbidden</u>

 18 <u>A person, firm or corporation who is owner, seller or</u> <u>transporter of nursery stock may not bring into this State any</u>
20 <u>nursery stock unless each package bears an unexpired official</u> <u>certificate of inspection that meets the requirements of section</u>
22 <u>2215.</u>

24 <u>§2217. Violations</u>

 26 <u>Any violation of sections 2211 to 2216, this section and</u> <u>rules pursuant to section 2218, is a civil violation for which a</u>
28 <u>forfeiture of not less than \$500 may be adjudged.</u>

30 **§2218.** Powers and rules

32 The commissioner, in a manner consistent with the Maine
Administrative Procedure Act as defined in Title 5, sections 8001
34 to 8062, may adopt rules to implement this chapter.

Sec. 3. 32 MRSA §1901, as amended by PL 1977, c. 694, §586, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

<u>§1901. License required; fee; violation</u>

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A person, firm or corporation may not engage in or continue in the business of selling or dealing in nursery stock, as 42 defined in Title 7, section 2211, without first obtaining a 44 license to conduct such business in this State. The State Horticulturist shall prescribe the form of the license. Licenses 46 must be issued upon proper application. The license fee is \$20 annually. The license must be issued in the name of the nursery 48 owner or dealer. A license may not be transferred. Each separate agent and each separate store acting under a general 50 agent or store must have a license as provided in this section. Licenses may be revoked by the Administrative Court, in a manner consistent with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, for failure to comply with the requirements of Title 7, chapter 405-A.

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#### STATEMENT OF FACT

The Maine Revised Statutes, Title 7, section 2202 currently 8 requires that establishments that handle nursery stock be inspected annually. Additionally, Title 32, section 1901 10 requires that any person, firm or corporation that handles nursery stock must be licensed to conduct such business in the 12 State. Over the past several years, many individuals who are not bonafide handlers of nursery stock have become licensed under 14 Title 32, making it impossible for the State Horticulturist to carry out the inspection program mandated by Title 7.

This bill clarifies the definition of nursery stock, and 18 defines plant pest and material other than nursery stock that may be subject to inspection. The bill establishes a procedure that must be followed by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural 20 Resources when nurseries are found to be infested with plant pests. It authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and 22 Rural Resources to assess fees for the inspection of material other than nursery stock. It also authorizes the commissioner to 24 adopt rules to implement the provisions of the bill. Also, the fee for obtaining a license to sell or deal in nursery stock is 26 increased from \$5 every 3 years to \$20 annually.
