"Massage therapist" means a person who provides or offers to provide massage therapy for a fee, 38 monetary or otherwise. This definition includes the use of 40 different forms of the term "massage therapist," such as "masseuse" or "masseur." 42 4. Massage therapy. "Massage therapy" means a scientific or skillful manipulation of soft tissue for therapeutic or 44 remedial purposes, specifically for improving muscle tone and circulation and promoting health and physical well-being. 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	term includes, but is not limited to, manual and mechanical

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	The commissioner or the commissioner's designee has the
14	following powers and duties in addition to all other powers and
	<u>duties set forth in this chapter.</u>

	1. Standards. The commissioner shall administer and
18	enforce this chapter.

20	2. Rules. The commissioner shall adopt rules in accordance
22	with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act necessary to carry
22	out the purposes of this chapter.
24	3. Complaints. The commissioner shall investigate or cause

	4. Contracts. The commissioner may enter into contracts to

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§14303. Employees

The commissioner may appoint, subject to the Civil Service Law, employees necessary to carry out this chapter. Any person so employed is considered to be in the department and under the administrative and supervisory direction of the commissioner.

§14304. Registration

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1. Registration required. Effective January 1, 1992 a person, unless specifically exempted by this chapter, may not use 12 the title "massage therapist" or profess to be a massage therapist unless registered in accordance with this chapter. 14

16 Each individual using the title "massage therapist" or professing to be a massage therapist shall register with the department every year. Each individual who registers shall fill out a form 18 designated by the department. Registration expires yearly on 20 December 31st or on such other date as the commissioner determines. Notice of expiration must be mailed to each registered massage therapist's last known address at least 30 22 days before the expiration of the registration. The notice must 24 include any requests for information necessary for renewal.

2. Individual registration. Only an individual may be 26 registered under this chapter.

§14305. Requirements for registration

- To be eligible for registration as a massage therapist an 32 applicant must:
 - 1. Age. Be at least 18 years of age;
- 2. Photograph. Furnish to the department 2 signed 36 photographs of the applicant. The photographs must be a minimum 38 size of 5 inches by 3 inches;

40 3. Doctor's certificate. Present a written statement from a physician licensed to practice in the State stating that the applicant has been examined and found to be free of an infectious 42 or communicable disease and showing that the examination was conducted within 60 days prior to the submission of the 44 application;

4. Criminal history. Present or have submitted to the department a report from the Department of Public Safety setting 48 forth the state and federal criminal record of the applicant or 50 the absence thereof;

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2	5. References. Present 3 character references citing that the applicant is of good moral character, one of which must be
	from a health care provider who is not a massage therapist;
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6	<u>6. High school. Possess a high school diploma or its</u> equivalent; and
8	7. Fee. Pay a one-time application fee of \$25 and a yearly registration fee of \$100. All fees are nonrefundable.
10	<u>§14306. Registration not allowed</u>
12	An individual whose license, certification or registration
14	has been refused, revoked or suspended for violations that would be grounds for similar action under section 14308 in this or any
16	other state and in this or any related field may not be registered to practice in this State unless the period of
18	refusal, revocation or suspension has been completed and the department has conducted a review and determined that
2 0 ·	rehabilitation has taken place.
22	<u>§14307. Exemptions to registration</u>
24	1. Other professionals. This chapter does not apply to the activities or services of members of other professions licensed,
26	certified or registered by the State, including, but not limited to, physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists,
28	cosmetologists or registered nurses performing soft tissue manipulation consistent with the laws of the State governing
30	their practices, provided they do not use the title "massage therapist."
32	2. Other exemptions. This chapter does not apply to the
34	activities and services of individuals who practice other forms of tissue work exclusive of massage therapy, such as rolfing,
36	Trager, reflexology, Shiatsu, Reiki and polarity, if those practitioners do not use the title "massage therapist," unless
38	they choose to meet the requirements of this chapter.
40	<u>§14308. Disciplinary action; grounds; procedure; complaints</u>
42	1. Grounds. The commissioner may suspend, revoke or refuse to renew registration under the same grounds as contained in
44	Title 5, section 10004. In addition, the commissioner may take
46	the same action granted to bureaus, boards and commissions pursuant to Title 10, section 8003, subsection 5. The
48	<u>commissioner's actions may be based on any of the following grounds:</u>
50	A. The practice of fraud or deceit in obtaining
52	registration status under this chapter or in connection with service rendered within the scope of the registration issued;
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B. Habitual intemperance in the use of alcohol or the habitual use of narcotic or other drugs that has resulted in the regulated person being unable to perform necessary duties or performing those duties in a manner that would endanger the health or safety of clients;

- <u>C. A current medical finding of mental incompetence that affects the registrant's ability to perform the registrant's occupation in a healthy and safe manner;</u>
 - <u>D. Aiding or abetting persons not duly registered under</u> this chapter who profess to be registered;
- E. Subject to the limitations of Title 5, chapter 341, conviction of a crime that involves dishonesty or false statement or that directly relates to the practice of massage therapy or conviction of a crime for which incarceration for one year or more may be imposed;

F. Revocation in any state of a professional or occupational license, certification or registration for disciplinary reasons, or rejection of any application for reasons related to untrustworthiness, within 3 years of the date of application; and

<u>G. Violating any provisions of this chapter or any rule of the department.</u>

2. Procedure. Except as provided in Title 5, section 10004

 a registration may not be denied, suspended, revoked or refused
 for renewal for the reasons set forth in subsection 1 without prior written notice and opportunity for hearing on that denial,
 suspension or revocation. A registration may not be denied, suspended or revoked under this section except by a decision of
 the commissioner or the commissioner's designee.

38 3. Complaints. Any person may file a complaint with the commissioner seeking disciplinary action against a massage therapist concerning violations of this chapter or rules adopted 40 by the department. Complaints must be in writing. If the commissioner determines that a complaint alleges facts that, if 42 true, would require denial, revocation, suspension or nonrenewal or other disciplinary action of a registered therapist, the 44 commissioner or the commissioner's designee may conduct a hearing 46 pursuant to the Maine Administrative Procedure Act. Whenever the commissioner establishes that a complaint does not state facts 48 that warrant action the complaint may be dismissed.

14	This bill requires that persons wh massage therapists register with the D and Financial Regulation. Allocations	epartment of P	rofessional

16 funds to the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation of \$25,800 in fiscal year 1991-92 and \$23,400 in fiscal year 18 1992-93 are required to provide for a Clerk Typist III position, general operating expenses, indirect costs related to accounting 20 and capital equipment including a computer. Dedicated revenues from registration fees will generate sufficient resources to 22 provide for this allocation.

24 This bill also establishes a new Class E crime and provides that complaints may be filed in Superior Court to enjoin 26 violations of the new requirements. The additional work load and administrative costs associated with a minimal number of new 28 cases filed in District Court as a result of the violations and the new cases filed in Superior Court for injunctive relief will 30 be absorbed within the budgeted resources of the Judicial Department.

The Department of the Attorney General will absorb the costs of filing complaints within its budgeted resources.

36 Sentences imposed for a Class E offense must be served in a county jail facility. The projected cost to a county for each 38 person sentenced under the new Class E crime is approximately \$3,820 and is based upon an average length of stay of 67 days.'

STATEMENT OF FACT

44 The original bill requires that to practice massage therapy a person must either be registered with the State with no 46 qualifications required or certified by the State as possessing certain qualifications. There are a number of grounds for 48 disciplinary action including incompetence and unprofessional conduct. A board is established to regulate the practice.

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This amendment removes regulation of the practice of massage therapy by the Board of Massage Therapy. It requires that to use

the title "massage therapist" a person must be registered with 2 the State. Among the qualifications for registration are freedom from infectious disease and 3 character references. Also, 4 pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 341, the Commissioner of Professional and Financial Regulation, who is 6 responsible for regulating the practice of massage therapy, may consider conviction for certain crimes, including those directly 8 related to the practice of massage therapy, in deciding whether to grant registration. Incompetence and unprofessional conduct are eliminated as grounds for disciplinary action. 10 A yearly registration fee of \$100 plus a one-time application fee of \$25 12 is required.
