vehicle from the duty to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons, nor do those subsections protect the operator from the consequences of the operator's reckless disregard for the safety of others.

Sec. 6. 29 MRSA \$1362, 2nd \P , as amended by PL 1989, c. 32, \$2, is further amended to read:

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No signaling device may be unnecessarily sounded nor any braking or acceleration unnecessarily made so as to cause a harsh, objectionable or unreasonable noise. 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STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill clarifies the display and use of auxiliary and emergency lights by repealing the sections in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 29 that refer to such lights and enacting the provisions of these sections in one new section. The bill also consolidates the sections on right-of-way, exercise of privileges and use of sirens by authorized emergency vehicles.
