Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

10 State-funded community-based programs providing services to with mentalretardation are experiencing difficulties in maintaining a qualified work force due to the 12 very low wages and benefits they are able to pay. The resulting instability jeopardizes the effectiveness of the programs that provide support to persons with mental retardation who are living in the community, including boarding homes, day programs, supported employment programs, foster homes and supervised apartments.

Funding has been appropriated to improve staff retention in intermediate care facilities, but the problem has not been addressed in other programs. In a study completed in October 1990, the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, Bureau of Mental Retardation has documented the fact that wages and benefits paid to direct care staff in community programs are significantly lower than those of workers in state facilities.

This resolve requires the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation to develop a proposal to establish parity in wages and benefits between community-based programs and state The proposal may also include facilities. any recommendations determined necessary to improve staff retention. department's recommendations will be reported to Legislature by January 15, 1992.
