STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETY-ONE

Resolve, to Create the Commission on Effective Information Systems in State Government.

Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission on Effective Information Systems in State Government is established; and be it further

Sec. 2. Commission membership; chair. Resolved: That the commission consists of the following 13 members:

8 1. Three members appointed by the President of the Senate, not more than one of whom may be a Legislator and not more than 10 one of whom may be employed by the State;

 Three members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, not more than one of whom may be a Legislator and not more than one of whom may be employed by the State;

3. Six members appointed by the Governor, not more than one of whom may be a Legislator and not more than one of whom may be employed by the State; and

4. One member appointed by the other 12 commission members who shall serve as the chair; and be it further

Sec. 3. Appointment; meetings. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council must be notified by the Governor, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives when their selections have been made. The Chair of the Legislative Council shall call the first meeting of the commission, at which time the commission may appoint the 13th and final commission member; and be it further

Sec. 4. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall undertake a study of the existing information management systems in State Government, with a primary goal of proposing an effective information management system within State Government. As part of the study, the commission shall:

Identify the data and information currently being
compiled within State Government; who uses it and how; and the data and information unavailable for critical purposes such as
projecting trends and monitoring change;

2. Investigate the impact of an information management system on current management style;

3. Recommend ways to manage and update data and information in a readily accessible, integrated and meaningful format and ways to ensure that quantifiable measures are available for monitoring change in the State's environment, economy, people and governmental activity;

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4. Evaluate alternative information management systems;

5. Recommend ways to improve and connect existing electronic networks and review and improve the procedures for purchasing computer systems;

Assess the need for a cabinet-level Chief Information
Officer; and

 7. Review methods to conduct long-term cost-benefit analyses of state initiatives, computerized access links at
regional and local governmental offices and libraries and the office environments of the future.

In the performance of its duties, the commission may hold 16 public hearings and conferences with any person, persons, organizations or governmental agencies. The commission is to be 18 provided information, reports or other assistance from any department, legislative committee agency, or other instrumentality of the State, with the consent of the head of the 20 respective organization. State agencies shall, upon request, assist the commission in carrying out the purposes of this 22 resolve; and be it further

Sec. 5. Report. Resolved: That the commission shall submit its report, together with any necessary implementing legislation, to the Second Regular Session of the 115th Legislature no later than November 1, 1992; and be it further

Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the State Planning Office shall staff the commission to conduct research and prepare reports for the commission; and be it further

34 Sec. 7. Reimbursement. Resolved: That the members of the commission who are Legislators are entitled to the legislative 36 per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, for days of attendance at commission meetings. All 38 members of the commission who are not state employees are entitled to expenses, as defined in Title 5, section 12002, upon 40 application to the Executive Director of the Legislative Council for those expenses; and be it further

Sec. 8. Appropriation. Resolved: That the following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this resolve.
