An Act Concerning the Use of Deer Killed by Farmers.



### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

12 MRSA §7502, sub-§4, as amended by PL 1979, c.723, §22, is further amended to read:

4. Warden's certificate. The game warden shall immediately investigate the case and, if he—is satisfied that the deer or other wild animal was taken as provided in this section, he the game warden shall give the person who killed the deer or other wild animal a certificate of his finding in the matter. The If the carcass is edible, the certificate entitles the person to the ewnership—ef—the—carcass—or—carcasses,—to—be—pessessed—and eensumed—only—within—the—immediate—family—ef—the—ewner—of—the ereps—or—the—person—who—killed—the—deer—or—ether—wild—animal temporary possession of the carcass, but the carcass and the certificate must be transferred within 14 days to a charitable organization that provides food or meals to persons in need. The commissioner shall adopt rules under the Maine Administrative Procedure Act to implement this subsection. If the carcass is inedible, it must be disposed of within 14 days.

#### STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill provides that when a deer or other edible wild animal is destroyed for causing crop damage, the carcass must be turned over to a charitable organization that provides food or meals to persons in need. Current law allows the carcass to be kept for personal or family consumption.
