An Act to Facilitate the Delivery of Family Support Services.

V is enacted to read: 18 SUBCHAPTER V 20 FAMILY SUPPORT SERVICES 22 <u>\$1801.</u> Definitions 24 As used in this subchapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings. 26 1. Crisis intervention. "Crisis intervention" means an unplanned and temporary service necessary to alleviate a crisis 28 and preserve the living arrangements of a person who receives 30 services from the department. 32 Family support services. "Family support services" 2. means services that enable a family, which is otherwise eligible 34 to receive services from the department, to maintain and care for its minor or adult member at home. Family support services 36 include but are not limited to the following: 38 A. Dental and medical care; 40 B. Respite care; C. Recreation and leisure activities; 42 D. Homemaker services; 44 46 E. Transportation; 48 F. Personal assistance services; 50 G. Home health services;

32	3. Office. "Office" means the Office of Family Support established under section 1803.
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36	4. Respite care. "Respite care" means a temporary service that provides a respite to a family in a planned and predictable
38	manner. Respite care may include but is not limited to bringing outside caretakers into the home and bringing a child outside the
40	<u>home for services.</u> 5. Service coordination. "Service coordination" means a
42	lifelong, goal-oriented process for coordination of the range of
44	<u>services needed and wanted by persons with disabilities and their</u> families.
46	6. Therapeutic services. "Therapeutic services" means
48	occupational, physical, speech and language, respiratory, and vision therapy, counseling and other therapies to increase,
50	<u>maintain or improve the functional capabilities of persons with</u> <u>disabilities.</u>

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2 §1802. Principles of family support 4 The department shall provide family support services in accordance with the following principles. б 1. Importance of family setting and home care. Children, regardless of the type or severity of their disabilities, belong 8 with and do best with families. Accordingly, families should receive whatever support is necessary to care for their family 10 members with disabilities at home. 12 2. Focus on whole family. Family support must focus on the 14 needs of the entire family. 16 3. Flexibility. Family needs change over time and family support must be flexible and responsive to the unique needs and 18 strengths of individual families. 4. Integration. Families should be supported to fully 20 integrate their family members with disabilities into education, employment and social settings in their own communities. Support 22 to families must build on social networks and other sources of support that exist in their communities. 24 26 5. Long-term support. Family support is needed throughout the life spans of family members with disabilities. 28 6. Family expertise. Families should be recognized as 30 experts regarding the needs of their members with disabilities. The family should be the primary decision-making unit regarding 32 the support, services and opportunities it needs. Accordingly, families must be included in the planning and implementation of 34 family support systems. 7. Family contributions. Families that have members with 36 disabilities should be recognized for enriching the lives of all citizens through their contributions to the economic health and 38 social fabric of the State. 40 8. Individual needs and aspirations. People with disabilities have personal needs and preferences to live, work, 42 learn, grow and to have relationships. People with disabilities 44 have abilities, competencies and aspirations and should be supported to pursue their personal desires and reach their 46 fullest potential. §1803. Office of Family Support 48 50 The commissioner shall establish the Office of Family

Support within the department to coordinate the development and implementation of consistent family support policies and services among the department's bureaus. The commissioner shall appoint at least one person from each bureau to the office and shall carry out the duties of the office within the resources existing in the bureaus. The commissioner shall designate a director of the office from among the appointees. The duties of the office include but are not limited to the following.

**1. Resource allocation.** The office shall make recommendations to the commissioner regarding the allocation or reallocation of family support resources among the bureaus.

 14 2. Policy development and implementation. The office shall develop and implement family support policy that is consistent
16 among the bureaus.

 18 <u>3. Service coordination and monitoring.</u> The office shall oversee service coordination for families who are served by more
20 than one bureau and shall resolve interbureau disagreements.

 4. Liaison to other departments. The office shall serve as the department's liaison to other departments when a family is
served by more than one department.

26 **§1804.** Regional family support councils

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28 The commissioner shall appoint a regional family support council as established in Title 5, section 12004-I, subsection 30 <u>59-B in each of the department's regions. Each council shall have 12 members, all of whom are persons with disabilities or 32 family members of persons with disabilities. Each council shall select its chair who shall serve on the Maine Family Support 34 Council.</u>

 36 Each council shall determine which family support services are needed in its region and shall assist the commissioner to
38 plan the development and implementation of those services. Each council shall participate in all departmental planning activities
40 that are required by state or federal mandates. Each council shall assist the commissioner to plan for the community services
42 needed to meet the requirements of the Pineland consent decree, the Augusta Mental Health Institute consent decree and any other
44 court judgments that affect services to families.

- 46 <u>§1805. Maine Family Support Council</u>
- The Maine Family Support Council, as established in Title 5, section 12004-I, subsection 59-C, consists of the chairs of each
  of the regional family support councils. The council shall

select its chair. The director of the office shall coordinate staff assistance to the council from the bureaus that comprise 2 the office. 4 The Maine Family Support Council shall advise the commissioner and the office regarding the statewide development 6 and implementation of family support services. 8 <u>\$1806.</u> Authority to provide family support services 10 The commissioner may provide family support services directly from the department or through agreements with community 12 agencies. Agreements with community agencies must be in accordance with section 1208, subsections 2 and 3. 14 **§1807.** Rules 16 The commissioner shall adopt rules in accordance with Title 18 5, chapter 375 to implement this subchapter. 20 STATEMENT OF FACT 22 This bill creates the Office of Family Support within the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. The office 24 is organized within existing resources to coordinate the development and implementation of family support policy among the 26 department's bureaus. 28 This bill establishes principles for the delivery of family support services and creates regional family support councils and 30 a statewide family support council to form the policy and planning processes. 32

34 The bill clarifies the authority of the Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation to provide family support 36 services directly or through community agencies.
