STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETY-ONE

RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Maine to Provide for the Direct Popular Election of Constitutional Officers.

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Constitutional amendment. RESOLVED: Two thirds of each branch of the Legislature concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of Maine be proposed:

Constitution, Art. V, Pt. 2nd, §1 is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

 8 Section 1. Election. The Secretary of State must be chosen biennially by popular election on the same date and in the same
10 manner as provided by this Constitution for the election of Senators and Representatives. Vacancy in that office must be
12 filled by appointment by the Governor, subject to confirmation as required by this Constitution for Justices of the Supreme
14 Judicial Court.

16 Constitution, Art. V, Pt. 3rd, §1 is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

Section 1.Election.The Treasurer must be chosen20biennially by popular election on the same date and in the same
manner as provided by this Constitution for the election of22Senators and Representatives.Vacancy in that office must be
filled by appointment by the Governor, subject to confirmation as24required by this Constitution for Justices of the Supreme
Judicial Court.

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Constitution, Art. IX, §11 is amended to read:

Section 11. Attorney General. The Attorney General shall
must be chosen biennially by joint-ballet popular election on the same date and in the same manner as provided by this Constitution
for the election of the Senators and Representatives in convention. Vacancy in said that office occurring-when-the
Legislature-is-not-in-session,-may must be filled by appointment by the Governor, subject to confirmation as required by this
Constitution for Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court.

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; and be it further

Constitutional referendum procedure; form of question; effective date. Resolved: That the municipal officers of this State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law for holding a statewide election, at a statewide election, on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November following the passage of this resolution, to vote upon the ratification of the amendment proposed in this resolution by voting upon the following question: "Shall the Constitution of Maine be amended to provide that the Attorney General, the Secretary of State and the Treasurer of State be elected by the people biennially in the same manner as members of the Senate and the House of Representatives?"

8 The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall vote by ballot on this question, and shall designate their choice 10 by a cross or check mark placed within the corresponding square below the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots must be received, 12 sorted, counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same 14 manner as votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review the returns and, if it appears that a majority of 16 the legal votes are cast in favor of the amendment, the Governor shall proclaim that fact without delay and the amendment becomes 18 part of the Constitution on the date of the proclamation; and be it further

Secretary of State shall prepare ballots. Resolved: That the Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each city, town and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this resolution necessary to carry out the purposes of this referendum.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This resolution provides for direct popular election of the 30 State's constitutional officers in the manner currently provided for Senators and Representatives.

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
