An Act to Establish Ombudsman Positions with the Board of Registration in Medicine and the Board of Osteopathic Examination and Registration.

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1. Ombudsman established. The Governor shall appoint an ombudsman to serve on the staff of the Board of Registration in Medicine as an advocate for consumers of medical care and services. The person selected as ombudsman must have at least 5 years of experience in a health care profession, a field related to health care or consumer advocacy. The term of office for the ombudsman is 6 years. The Governor may remove the ombudsman from office for malfeasance, misfeasance, nonfeasance or other good cause after delivering written notice to the ombudsman of the reasons for which the Governor intends to remove the ombudsman and providing an opportunity to appear and show cause why the ombudsman should not be removed.

2. Duties. The ombudsman shall:

A. Serve as an advocate for consumers of medical care who have filed complaints with the board by assisting them in the presentation of their complaint, by tracking and monitoring the board's action on complaints, informing complainants about actions the board has taken and monitoring board procedures to see that consumers receive fair treatment;

B. Inform the public about the role of the board; and

- C. Furnish to the public, on request, information about physician discipline, including past and current disciplinary actions, voluntary surrenders of licenses by physicians and restrictions placed on a physician's practice.

- 4. Information program. The board shall establish a program, which the ombudsman shall coordinate, to inform physicians and medical students about the role and policies of the board.
- 5. Compensation. The ombudsman is entitled to compensation to be paid by the board from registration fees collected by the board under this chapter.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill establishes 2 ombudsman positions. The ombudsmen will serve as advocates for consumers of medical care and to provide education and information to those consumers. One ombudsman will serve on the staff of the Board of Registration in Medicine and one will serve on the staff of the Board of Osteopathic Examination and Registration. The compensation of

both ombudsmen will be paid out of registration fees collected by the 2 boards.
