16	§15151. Decennnial Commission on Maine's Future
18	1. Decennial Commission on Maine's Future established. The Decennial Commission on Maine's Future, established in section
20	12004-I, subsection 77-A, convenes in January 1994 and every 10 years thereafter.
22	
24	2. Commission membership; chair. The commission consists of the following 26 members:
26	A. Six members appointed by the President of the Senate, not more than 2 of whom may be Legislators and not more than
28	2 of whom may be employed by the State;
30	B. Six members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, not more than 2 of whom may be Legislators
32	and not more than 2 of whom may be employed by the State;
34	C. Twelve members appointed by the Governor, not more than 2 of whom may be Legislators and not more than 2 of whom may
36	be employed by the State; and
38	D. Two members, who shall serve as the chair and vice-chair, appointed by the other 24 commission members.

	3. Appointments; meetings. All appointments must be made
42	no later than January 15th in each year that the commission is
	convened. The President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House
44	of Representatives and the Governor shall notify the Legislative
	Council when their selections have been made. The Chair of the
46	Legislative Council shall call the first meeting of the
	commission, at which time the commission may appoint the 2 final
48	commission members. The commission members serve terms that
	expire 6 months after the submission of their final report to

46	In the performance of its duties, the commission may hold public

assist the commission in carrying out the purposes of this chapter.

5. Report. The commission shall submit its final report to the Governor and to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over state and local government matters no later than 18 months after the commission has convened. The final report must contain any necessary implementing legislation.

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6. Staff assistance. Prior to the convening of the commission, the State Planning Office shall coordinate the preparation of quantifiable measures of change and forecasts related to the environment, economy, people and government of this State. Upon the convening of the commission, the State Planning Office shall staff the commission to conduct research, prepare reports and draft legislation for the commission.

7. Reimbursement. The members of the commission who are Legislators are entitled to the legislative per diem, as defined in Title 3, section 2, for days of attendance at commission meetings. All members of the commission who are not state employees are entitled to expenses, as defined in section 12002, upon application to the Executive Director of the Legislative Council for those expenses.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

This is one of 8 bills containing the recommendations of the Commission on Maine's Future. This bill establishes the Decennial Commission on Maine's Future, which will convene every 10 years following the publication of each decennial census. The commission will review and recommend changes to the "Maine Vision," analyze forces and trends in Maine life, estimate the future effects of those forces and trends and recommend actions to mitigate, avoid or encourage those various effects. The commission will also review the capacity of government and private institutions in Maine to anticipate and react to the forces and trends affecting Maine's future and recommend actions to enhance that capacity.
