An Act to Encourage Waste Reduction and Recycling.

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38 MRSA §2141 is enacted to read:

§2141. Waste reduction and recycling labeling program

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The office shall implement a labeling program establishing official recycling emblems and standards for the use of recycling emblems and the terms "reusable," "recyclable," "recycled" and "recycled content."

1. Applicability. The labeling program applies to any person who wishes to use an emblem or term as defined by rule on a package or product, or in the promotion or advertisement of a package or product that is sold or offered for sale.

2. Rules. The agency shall adopt rules implementing this section in consultation with the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. Rules must be adopted in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act. A rule adopted pursuant to this section does not add or remove prohibitions on products or packaging.

3. Enforcement. The Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources shall enforce the provisions of this section and may inspect, with the consent of the owner or agent, any property or building to accomplish the objectives of this section.

4. Penalties. Any manufacturer or supplier that violates this section commits a civil violation for which a forfeiture of not more than \$100 may be adjudged. Each product or package in violation constitutes the basis of a separate offense.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill establishes a voluntary labeling program for products or packaging that is reusable, recyclable or contain recycled content. The bill provides the Maine Waste Management Agency with the authority to develop standards implementing a labeling program through rule. Ten northeastern states have agreed to develop and implement a regional labeling program to provide consistency and uniformity in the use of the terms "reusable," "recyclable" and "recycled content" and recycling emblems. Rhode Island and New York have already developed similar programs.
