6	FISCAL NOTE
8	This bill requires a General Fund appropriation of \$194,940 in fiscal year 1991-92 and \$364,718 in fiscal year 1992-93 to
.0 ,	fund salary increases for the constitutional officers and the State Auditor, Maine's justices and judges and commissioners of
.2	the Public Utilities Commission and the Workers' Compensation Commission. This bill also requires a Highway Fund allocation of
.6	\$2,181 in fiscal year 1991-92 and \$2,306 in fiscal year 1992-93 to fund 50% of the salary increase proposed for the Secretary of State.
L 8	In addition, this bill implements statutory language that
20	will generate future costs to the General Fund in the 1994-95 biennium. These future costs include implementing the 3rd-year salary increase of 3% for Maine's justices and judges,
22	implementing state funding for Legislators' basic life insurance and increasing the State's share of the health plan premium for
24	dependent coverage to 60%.

28	STATEMENT OF FACT
30	This bill implements the recommendations made in the State Compensation Commission's final report to the 114th Legislature on November 15, 1990, including:
32	 Changing the State Compensation Commission's review of
34	gubernatorial compensation from the 3rd year of each term to the 2nd year;
36	 Authorizing a salary increase for members of the Public
38	Utilities Commission and the Workers' Compensation Commission upon their completion of their 3rd year of their first term. It
40	is the intent of the Legislature that commissioners who completed their 3rd year of their first term prior to the effective date of
42	these provisions are not eligible for retroactive salary increases;
14	3 Ingressing the colory range aggignments for the State
46	3. Increasing the salary range assignments for the State Auditor, the Secretary of State and the Treasurer of State, and increasing the minimum step for initial appointments of the
48	Secretary of State and the Treasurer of State;
50	4. Implementing a 3-year salary increase schedule of 3% each year, starting on July 1, 1991, fiscal year 1991-92; and

5. Increasing the State's share of the health plan premium for dependent coverage from 50% to 60% as was done for state employees in the most recent collective bargaining agreements and providing state funding for Legislators' basic life insurance, as is provided currently for state employees.
