STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETY-ONE

Resolve, to Establish an Alternative Waste Reduction and Energy-producing Demonstration Project.

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Preamble. Whereas, the fees and costs associated with solid waste disposal are rising, in part due to changing economics of targe scale centralized incineration; and

Whoreas, the Legislature has contributed to the centralization and quasi-monopolistic structure of waste incineration; and

Whereas, federal clean water standards have resulted in the closing of municipal landfill facilities throughout the State; and

Whereas, the net effect of these factors is the limiting of options of municipalities to dispose of solid waste within their boundaries; and

Whereas, it is the responsibility of the Legislature to expand the disposal options available to Maine residents and municipal governments in an environmentally sound manner; now, therefore, be it

1. Sec. Demonstration project. **Resolved:** That the 22 municipalities of Rockland and Sangerville may undertake а one-year demonstration project to encourage alternative and 24 innovative waste reduction and energy-producing methods. The demonstration project must use a decentralized waste-to-energy recovery process for the open-hearth glassification of municipal 26 waste, composed of combustibles and biomass or materials 28 otherwise consigned to landfills.

 The municipalities of Rockland and Sangerville may enter into contracts with a business that offers such a process. That business shall conduct the actual operation of the incinerators.

Upon application of the business operating the incinerators, the Department of Environmental Protection shall
conduct air emission tests required for state and federal licensing of the technology. The applicant shall bear the cost
of any such testing; and be it further

Sec. 2. Rules. Resolved: That, by November 1, 1992, the Department of Environmental Protection shall adopt by rule air emission standards for the waste-to-energy recovery process used in the project. The rules may allow the department to transfer its monitoring function to municipalities through the use of local monitoring procedures authorized by the department.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

This resolve authorizes a one-year demonstration project, conducted by the municipalities of Rockland and Sangerville, to encourage alternative waste reduction and energy-producing methods. The municipalities represent an urbanized area and a rural settled place for testing purposes. The project will use an innovative waste-to-energy recovery process. The resolve requires air emission testing during the project.

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
