 interests of the education profession. A teachers organization
 and any affiliated organizations are considered a single

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- The Professional Standards Board for Teachers, as authorized in Title 5, section 12004-A, subsection 12-A, is established to involve teachers directly in establishing and maintaining the standards of their profession and to ensure fair treatment to individual applicants for licensure and all members of the profession.

a	The members of the board must be appointed by the Governor nd approved by the Legislature.	
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	1. Appointments. Appointments must be made by the Governor rom a list of at least 3 nominees for each position, submitted	
<u>ב</u> ס	o the Governor as follows.	

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A. Teacher members must be nominated by a teachers organization representing the majority of public school teachers in the State who teach at the educational level from which the appointment is being made.

B. Administrator members must be nominated by the elementary or secondary principal and superintendent organizations of administrators in which the majority of administrators of schools in the State have membership.

<u>C. Teacher education members must be nominated by a national council of higher education.</u>

D. Public members must be nominated by the parent-teacher organization representing a majority of parents in the State.

2. Vacancies. A vacancy on the board must be filled for
 the remainder of the unexpired term in the same manner as the original appointment within 60 days after the vacancy occurs.
 Nominations to fill a vacancy must be submitted by the appropriate organization within 30 days after the vacancy occurs.
 Nominations to fill an expiring term must be submitted at least 30 days before the expiration of the term.

The Governor shall appoint members from among the nominations submitted pursuant to this section. If no timely nominations are received or the nominations received do not include a sufficient number of gualified candidates, the Governor may appoint any gualified person. Nominations may be withdrawn by the organizations that made them.

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48	1. Elections of officers; chair. The board shall elect, by
FO	a majority vote of its members, a chair and a vice-chair from
.50	<u>among the membership. At the last regular meeting of each</u>

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calendar year the chair and vice-chair are elected for one-year terms and may be reelected up to 2 times. A member may not serve as chair or vice-chair for more than 3 consecutive years. The chair and vice-chair may be removed from office at any time by a majority of the board's members, in which event the vacancy must be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as the original selection.

2. Authority of chair; vice-chair. The chair shall serve
10 as the presiding officer at meetings of the board and is an ex officio member of all committees established within the board.
12 In the absence of the chair, or if the chair is unable to act, the vice-chair has the powers and shall perform the duties of the
14 chair. The chair and vice-chair have such powers and duties as may be necessary for the performance of the functions of their
16 offices. If both the chair and vice-chair are absent from or unable to act at a meeting, the board shall elect for that
18 meeting a chair pro tempore.

3. Meetings; headquarters. The board shall hold regular 20 meetings at least 4 times each year and shall hold such other special meetings as may be necessary. The board's headquarters 22 is in Augusta; meetings are held primarily in Augusta, but may be 24 held at any place in the State designated by the board. The chair may call a special meeting of the board at any time and 26 shall call a special meeting upon the written request of 7 or more members of the board. Members must be mailed written notice of the time and place of all regular meetings at least 14 days 28 prior to each such meeting. Members must be mailed written 30 notice of the time, place and purpose of all special meetings at least 7 days prior to each such meeting whenever practicable.

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4. Quorum; minutes; agenda. Seven members of the board 34 constitute a guorum for transaction of business. All meetings of the board must be open and public, unless the board calls for an 36 executive session and publicly sets forth a written statement of reasons for such session. Unofficial minutes of each board 38 meeting must be prepared and mailed to each member of the board at least 14 days prior to the next regular meeting. An agenda 40 must be prepared for each meeting by or at the direction of the chair. Members must be mailed the agenda for each regular 42 meeting at least 7 days prior to each such meeting. Members must be mailed the agenda for each special meeting at least 3 days 44 prior to each such meeting whenever practicable.

 46 <u>5. Official seal.</u> The board must have an official seal, which must be judicially noticed.

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Sec. 4. Reports, recommendations; committees. By January 15, 1994, the board shall submit a report on its activities to the 2 joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters. Thereafter, the board shall submit to 4 the Governor and the Legislature and publish an annual report of 6 activities. This annual report must include specific its findings and conclusions with regard to licensure and teacher preparation program approval, an official audit of all board 8 expenditures, and such additional information as the board 10 considers appropriate. The board shall publish, from time to time, such other reports as it considers appropriate. The board 12 shall develop and recommend to the Legislature for its consideration any necessary or desirable legislation with regard 14 to the matters covered by this Act.

16 Sec. 5. Delegation of functions. Except as otherwise provided in this Act, the board may delegate to one or more of its members,
18 staff or other agents the authority to perform any of the functions to be performed by the board itself under this Act, and
20 performance by that delegate is for purposes of this Act deemed an action of the board.

Sec. 6. Interim chair. The Governor shall designate one member of the board to serve as chair until the board elects a chair pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 13049.

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Sec. 7. Transition provisions.

 Teacher certification laws in effect on the effective date of this Act, specifically the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, sections 13003 to 13007, 13011 to 13021 and 13031 to 13036
 as they pertain to teacher certification, continue to govern teacher licensing until amended by the Legislature, with the exception that the exclusive authority for teacher licensing as described in Title 20-A, section 13043 is vested in the Professional Standards Board for Teachers.

2. Any teacher license that was issued pursuant to the laws of the State prior to the effective date of this Act remains in
effect as long as the license continues to be valid under the laws and rules pursuant to which it was issued.

Any approval of a teacher preparation program that was
 granted pursuant to the laws of the State prior to the effective
 date of this Act remains in effect until the regular time for
 renewing approval, which must be done under this Act.

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4. The board created by this Act is the successor to the State Board of Education in matters relating to the issuance of

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certificates of license to teach in the schools of the State and
the approval of teacher education programs. The State Board of
Education continues to serve in that capacity until the effective
date of this Act.

5. Assets, liabilities, contracts, property, records and unexpended balances of appropriations or other funds employed,
held by or available to any state agency or department for carrying out the functions assigned to the board under this Act
are transferred to the board as of the effective date of this Act.

12 Sec. 8. Funding. All fees collected under this Act must be set at a level to produce revenue that does not substantially 14 exceed the cost and expense of administering this Act. All fees payable under this Act must be paid to and collected by the board 16 and transmitted for deposit to the General Fund.

18 Sec. 9. Funds transferred to General Fund. Notwithstanding the provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 13052, any excess money in the fund established by that section at the end of fiscal year 1992-93 must be transferred to the 22 General Fund.

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Sec. 10. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

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The creation of the Professional Standards Board for 2 Teachers will require an allocation of Other Special Revenue funds of \$127,107 in fiscal year 1992-93 for the salary and fringe benefit costs of an Executive Director position, a part-time Account Clerk II position, a Clerk Typist III position, 4 6 a Clerk Steno III position and an Education Specialist III position, general operating expenses and board expenses. The 8 bill will additionally result in a General Fund deappropriation to the Department of Education, Division of Certification, Placement and Teacher Education of \$72,107 in fiscal year 1992-93 10 from the elimination of a Clerk Typist III position, a Clerk Steno III position, an Education Specialist III position and a 12 part-time Account Clerk II position. The functions of these positions will be transferred to the new board. 14

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16 The bill includes dedicated licensing fees to provide funding for the board. These fees are expected to generate \$460,000 annually in dedicated revenue although only \$230,000 18 will be generated in fiscal year 1992-93 because of the January 1, 1993 effective date. Since some of these fees are currently 20 credited to the General Fund, a loss of undedicated revenue in the amount of \$350,000 annually, and \$175,000 in fiscal year 22 1992-93 is anticipated. The bill does provide, however, that any balance remaining in the board's dedicated account at June 30, 24 1993 be transferred to the General Fund. While it is expected that there will be no net General Fund impact in fiscal year 26 1992-93, there may be a net cost to the General Fund thereafter.' .

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STATEMENT OF FACT

32 This amendment retains the concept of a professional licensing board for educators from the bill but narrows its application to the licensure of teachers and the approval of 34 postsecondary teacher preparation programs. Several technical 36 changes are made to clarify the organization of the Professional Standards Board for Teachers, the implementation of professional 38 licensing requirements for teachers and teacher education approval programs beginning January 1, 1993, the treatment of funds collected for licenses and program approvals by the board 40 and the transition from a certification process by the State 42 Board of Education to licensure by the Professional Standards Board for Teachers. The amendment also adds a fiscal note and 44 appropriation and allocation sections to the bill.
