Further amend the bill in Part XX by striking out all of section 8.

<u>2-B. Legislative staff; limit. To appoint no more than 85 full-time staff members, subject to the limitation in paragraph A.</u>

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A. The number of full-time staff members employed by the Legislature may not be increased after December 31, 1991. Any staff member who resigns, retires or leaves for any other reason may not be replaced until the number of full-time staff members is reduced to 85. Any position that becomes vacant after the number of full-time staff members reaches 85 may be filled at the discretion of the Executive Director of the Legislative Council:

The date for submission of legislation for the first regular session is the 12 first Tuesday after the first Monday in December.
