An Act to Clarify the Water Quality Definitions for Impoundments.



Be it	enacted	by	the	People	of	the	State	of	Maine	as	follows:
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- 2 38 MRSA §466, sub-§§2, 9, 11 and 12, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 698, §15, are amended to read:
- 2. As naturally occurs. "As naturally occurs" means, except for impoundments, conditions with essentially the same physical, chemical and biological characteristics as found in situations with similar habitats free of measurable effects of human activity.
- 9. Natural. "Natural" means, except for impoundments, living in, or as if in, a state of nature not measurably affected by human activity.
- 16 II. Unimpaired. "Unimpaired" means, except for impoundments, without a diminished capacity to support aquatic life.
- 20 12. Without detrimental changes in the resident biological community. "Without detrimental changes in the resident 22 biological community" means, except for impoundments, no significant loss of species or excessive dominance by any species 24 or group of species attributable to human activity.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The present water classification scheme for lakes, ponds and rivers has been interpreted in some instances as requiring human-constructed impoundments to have fish and aquatic life habitat or other characteristics that would be found in natural bodies of water not affected by human activity. This bill clarifies that habitat and related aquatic life requirements for impoundments do not have to meet standards designed for natural bodies of water.
