An Act to Revise the Maine Horticultural Laws.

_	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec.1. 7 MRSA c.405, as amended, is repealed.
4	Sec. 2. 7 MRSA c. 405-A is enacted to read:
б	CHAPTER 405-A
8	HORTICULTURE
10	<u>§2211. Definition</u>
12	<u>As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise</u>
14	indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
16	 <u>Commissioner</u>. "Commissioner" includes a designee of the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources.
18	2. Nursery stock. "Nursery stock" means:
20	A. Woody plants, including ornamental and fruiting trees,
22	shrubs, vines and all viable parts of these plants;
24	<u>B. Herbaceous plants, including florist stock plants, annuals, perennials, vegetable seedlings, herbs, potted</u>
26	plants and all viable parts of these plants; and
28	<u>C. Any other plant or plant part designated by the commissioner if regulation is necessary to control any plant</u>
30	pest.
32	"Nursery stock" does not include cut Christmas trees, wreaths, field crops, seeds, dried herbs and flowers and cut flowers.
34	3. Nursery. "Nursery" means a place where nursery stock is
36	produced, stored or offered for sale.
38	4. Other materials. "Other materials" means, but is not limited to, material not included in the definition of "nursery
40	stock," such as containers, seeds and cut Christmas trees.
42	5. Plant pest. "Plant pest" means any insect, mite,
44	nematode, fungus, virus, bacteria, slug, snail or any form of aquatic or terrestrial plant or organism that may cause injury to a plant or that the commissioner declares to be a plant pest.
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48	6. State Horticulturist. "State Horticulturist" means the person appointed by the commissioner to carry out the duties of this chapter.
50	<u>\$2212. Inspection of nurseries</u>
52	SCOTS INSPECTION OF UNIPELIED

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1. Inspection. The State Horticulturist or an assistant shall inspect nurseries as determined necessary by the State 2 Horticulturist. Nurseries must be accessible at reasonable times for inspection. If plant pests are found at a level sufficient 4 to pose a threat of the spread of the pest by movement of the nursery stock, the State Horticulturist may issue an order б embargoing or detaining the nursery stock. An order issued under this section may not be considered licensing or an adjudicatory 8 proceeding as those terms are defined in the Maine Administrative Procedure Act. The State Horticulturist may prescribe measures 10 designed to control the plant pests. The State Horticulturist shall remove the order of embargo or detention if the State 12 Horticulturist is satisfied that the plant pests have been 14 controlled. A person may not offer for sale:

A. Nursery stock that is not healthy or will not maintain its vigor;

B. Dead nursery stock; or

C. Nursery stock stressed by drying, excessive heat or cold or any other condition limiting plant growth.

24 §2213. Inspection of other material

 Other material may be inspected by the State Horticulturist upon request to enable the movement or sale of this material.
 The commissioner may assess fees to cover the costs associated with these inspections. Funds generated from these fees must be deposited in a nonlapsing account to be used to conduct these inspections.

<u>§2214. Inspection of orchards, fields and gardens suspected of</u> <u>being infested with plant pests</u>

36 The State Horticulturist or an assistant may inspect any orchard, field, garden or roadside in public or private grounds 38 if the area is suspected of being infested with a plant pest that may be a threat to the health of plants belonging to other 40 property owners or to the health or safety of the general public. The State Horticulturist may, after notice and opportunity for a hearing is provided in a manner consistent with 42 the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, order the owner, occupant 44 or person in charge to take such action as necessary, including the proper treatment or destruction of any infested or diseased 46 plants. If the owner of the property or a person having lawful custody of the plants does not comply with the written order, the 48 commissioner may refer the matter to the Attorney General who may institute an action to abate the problem. 50

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§2215. Shipments into the State to be certified

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All nursery stock shipped into this State from any other 2 state, province or country must bear a certificate on each package stating that the contents were inspected by an authorized 4 inspecting officer and that the contents appear to be free from plant pests. The State Horticulturist or an assistant may inspect, at the point of destination, all nursery stock coming 6 into the State. If such nursery stock is infested with any plant pests, the State Horticulturist, after conferring with the 8 consignor, may order that stock destroyed or returned to the consignor at the consignor's expense. The decision of the State 10 Horticulturist to require destruction or return of infested 12 nursery stock may not be considered licensing or an adjudicatory proceeding as defined by the Maine Administrative Procedure Act. 14 §2216. Transportation of uninspected stock forbidden 16 A person, firm or corporation who is owner, seller or 18 transporter of nursery stock may not bring into this State any nursery stock unless each package bears an unexpired official certificate of inspection that meets the requirements of section 20 2215. 22 **§2217.** Violations 24 Any violation of section 2211, this section and rules pursuant to section 2218, is a civil violation for which a 26 forfeiture of not more than \$500 may be adjudged. 28 §2218. Powers and rules 30 The commissioner, in a manner consistent with the Maine 32 Administrative Procedure Act, may adopt rules to implement this chapter. 34 Sec. 3. 32 MRSA §1901, as amended by PL 1977, c. 694, §586, 36 is repealed and the following enacted in its place: 38 <u>§1901. License required; fee; violations</u> 40 A person, firm or corporation may not engage in or continue in the business of selling or dealing in nursery stock, as 42 defined in Title 7, section 2211, without first obtaining a license to conduct such business in this State. The State 44 Horticulturist shall prescribe the form of the license. Licenses must be issued upon proper application. The license fee is \$5 46 every 3 years. The license must be issued in the name of the nursery owner or dealer. A license may not be transferred. Each 48 separate agent and each separate store acting under a general agent or store must have a license as provided in this section. 50 Licenses may be revoked by the Administrative Court, in a manner consistent with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, for 52 failure to comply with the requirements of Title 7, chapter 405.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill clarifies the definition in the law of "nursery stock" and defines "plant pest" and material other than nursery stock that may be subject to inspection by the State Horticulturist. The bill establishes a procedure that must be followed by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources when nurseries are found to be infested with plant pests.

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
