#### STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETY-TWO

An Act to Create the Cushings Island Village Corporation.



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Sec. 1. Incorporation. The territory comprised within the limits of Cushings Island in the City of Portland, in the County of Cumberland, together with the inhabitants of the island, owners of real estate on the island and persons entitled to the use or occupation of real estate on the island constitute a body politic and corporate by the name of Cushings Island Village Corporation, referred to in this Act as "the corporation."

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Sec. 2. Powers. The corporation is authorized and vested with the power, at any legal meeting called for the purpose, to raise money for the following purposes: to create and maintain a fire department with all the necessary equipment, appliances and apparatus for the prevention and extinguishment of fires; to build, repair and maintain roads, streets and ways, sidewalks, sewers and other sanitary works, including the collection and removal of offal and garbage; to purchase, own, hold, sell, convey, lease, mortgage or otherwise dispose of real estate and to build, construct, lease, sell, mortgage or otherwise dispose of improvements to the real estate; to care for and beautify that portion of the island that has been or may be reserved for and dedicated to public uses to be enjoyed in common by all the owners of lots on the island and to that end to build roads and walks upon and through those public lands and to plant and care for trees on the roads and streets and upon those public lands; to build, repair and maintain public wharves and landings; to establish and maintain police and night watch; to procure water for fire, domestic and other purposes and to produce or procure electricity for public use and for the use of the inhabitants of the island, and for purposes of procuring water and electricity to contract with any individual, firm or corporation to furnish water or electricity for either or both of the purposes named and to establish reasonable rates to be paid by the inhabitants of the island using such water or electricity for domestic purposes; to construct, maintain and operate telephone or telegraph lines or to aid in construction, maintenance and operation and to contract with any corporation, firm or individual for the construction, maintenance and operation of telephone telegraph lines; to defray any and all other necessary or proper corporate charges; and to purchase necessary supplies equipment and employ labor, and to sell supplies and furnish equipment and labor for hire to the members of the corporation, and the overseers of the corporation may employ agents to carry out the provisions of this section.

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Sec. 3. Duties of City of Portland. The City of Portland is relieved from any and all duty to build, repair or maintain roads, streets or ways upon Cushings Island; to build and maintain schools or provide free schooling for any children residing on the island; or to perform any of the duties for which the

authorized by section 2 to raise money. The City of Portland is not liable for defects in streets, ways or roads on the island nor for failure to perform any duty from which it is relieved by this Act, but the corporation assumes all of these duties and is liable for defects in streets, ways and roads and for failure to perform the duties assumed as the City of Portland would be liable except for this Act, which liability is enforced under the same conditions, in the same manner and with the same remedies as are provided by law in relation to cities.

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Sec. 4. Roads. The corporation and the overseers of the corporation have the same power and duties in laying out, discontinuing and altering ways and roads on Cushings Island that the municipalities of the State now have, to be exercised and performed under the same conditions and limitations and in the same manner that they are now or may be exercised and performed by the municipalities of the State.

Sec. 5. Taxes. The City of Portland shall annually pay over to the treasurer of the corporation out of the taxes collected from the inhabitants and estates on Cushings Island pursuant to sections 6 and 10 a sum equal to 80% of those taxes less the fees entitled to be received by the collector of the City of Portland under section 10 exclusive of the state and county tax collected from the inhabitants and estates on Cushings Island. City taxes may not be assessed upon or collected from the inhabitants and estates on Cushings Island except as provided for in sections 6 and 10.

Sec. 6. Assessment. All money raised pursuant to section 10 for the purposes named in section 2, or for any other purpose for which the corporation may lawfully raise money, is assessed upon the taxable polls and estates within the limits of the corporation by the assessors of the City of Portland in the same manner provided by law for the assessment of city and county taxes. For the purposes of taxation under this Act, the person or persons entitled to the use or occupation of any lot of land on the island are determined to be the owner of the lot and may be taxed for the lot and the improvements on the lot.

Sec. 7. Officers; bylaws. The officers of the corporation who are chosen by ballot are a clerk, who must be a resident of this State, a treasurer and 5 overseers and any other officers the bylaws of the corporation may require. The corporation may adopt at any legal meeting called for that purpose a code of bylaws for the government of the corporation and for the proper management of the corporation's prudential affairs and other purposes connected with the operation of the corporation. The bylaws may be altered or amended at any legal meeting of the corporation in the call for which notice of the proposed change has been given. The officers are sworn before the clerk or a justice of the peace

and the treasurer must give bond to the corporation in a sum the overseers may direct, which bond must be approved by the overseers and clerk.

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- Sec. 8. Eligibility to hold office. Any person who is a legal voter in the corporation may be elected or appointed to any office, but ceases to hold that office whenever that person ceases to be a legal voter of the corporation.
- Sec. 9. Duties of overseers. The overseers are the general municipal officers of the corporation and have general charge of the corporation's affairs and the expenditure of all money, except so far as these may be committed to other officers or persons.
- Sec. 10. Certificate; duties of officers. Upon a certificate being filed with the assessors of the City of Portland by the clerk of the corporation of the amount of money voted to be raised at any meeting for any of the purposes stated in sections 2 and 6, it is the duty of the assessors or their successors in office, at the time of the next annual assessment of city and county taxes in the City of Portland, to assess the total amounts certified by the clerk of the corporation upon the polls and estates of persons owning land on the island as defined in section 6 and to certify and deliver the lists of the assessments made to the collector of the City of Portland, whose duty it is to collect the taxes in the same manner as county and city taxes are by law collected on property assessed in the county and city, and the collector shall pay over the amount provided for in section 5 from money collected by the collector to the treasurer of the corporation whenever the overseers so direct. It is the duty of the treasurer of the corporation to receive all money belonging to the corporation and to pay out the money only upon the written order or direction of the overseers and to keep a regular account of all money received and paid out and to exhibit the account to the overseers whenever requested, and the City of Portland has the same power to direct the mode of collecting taxes as is provided for by law in the collection of city taxes and the collector has the same rights and powers to recover any taxes committed to the collector under this Act by suit as are provided for by law in the collection of city taxes committed to the collector, and the City of Portland has the same right to recover taxes assessed under this Act by suit as is provided for by law to recover city taxes assessed in the city. The collector of the City of Portland is entitled to receive the same fees in connection with the collection of taxes assessed under this Act as are provided for by law in the collection of city taxes. corporation has the same power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes or to issue its notes, bonds or other evidence of indebtedness for municipal purposes as towns have under the laws of this State.

Sec. 11. Legal voters. All persons owning land within the limits of the corporation or entitled to the use or occupation of any lot of land within the limits of the corporation are legal voters at any meeting of the corporation at which they are The overseers of the corporation shall determine who are the legal voters at any meeting subsequent to acceptance of this charter and shall prepare a list of the voters at least 24 hours before every meeting, which list the overseers may amend or correct at any time before or during the meeting. The vote upon any propositions at any meeting must be taken and checked by this list upon the demand of 5 legal voters. Every person, who by virtue of a joint ownership with another person or persons of land within the limits of the corporation and by agreement with the other joint owner or owners is in possession of a certain aliquot part of a lot of land on the island upon which the legal voter has a dwelling house owned and controlled by the legal voter exclusively, is deemed a legal voter at any meeting of the corporation at which the legal voter is present. The majority in interest of the joint owners of any land within the limits of the corporation may designate in writing one of the owners to represent such land as the legal voter at any meeting of the corporation at which the legal voter is present, but no person is entitled to more than one vote in any meeting either for the legal voter or as representing the joint owners of any land within the limits of the corporation.

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Sec. 12. Officers; term of office; annual meeting. The first election of officers must be at the meeting at which the charter is accepted. The officers hold their respective offices until the next annual meeting. New officers are elected at each annual meeting. Terms of office are for one year. All officers hold office until their successors are elected and duly qualified. The annual meeting must be held at such time and place in the months of June, July, August or September as designated by a majority of the overseers.

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Sec. 13. Meeting called. Robert Chase, Howard Dana, Stephanie Weaver, Robert Neilsen and Sidney St. F. Thaxter, or any one of them, may call the meeting of the corporation for the purpose of voting on the acceptance of the charter and the election of officers, and may notify the legal voters of the corporation as determined by a list prepared by them to meet by mailing written notice of the meeting to the legal voters at least 10 days before the meeting. All subsequent meetings are called and notified by the overseers, as town meetings are called and notified by the city officials. Any of the above-named persons are authorized to preside at the meeting called for the purpose of voting on the acceptance of the charter until the meeting is organized and until a moderator is chosen by ballot and sworn. At all meetings of the corporation a moderator is chosen in the manner and with the same power as in town meetings.

	Sec. 14. Referendum; certificate to Secretary of State. This Act
