#### STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETY-TWO

An Act to Provide Immunity to Nonprofit Institutions That Donate Surplus Food.



### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

14 MRSA §166, sub-§§2 and 3, as enacted by PL 1981, c. 300, are amended to read:

- Immunity for donor. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a good faith donor of canned or perishable food, which including open-dated food, the date of which has passed, that is apparently fit for human consumption at the time it is donated, a bona fide charitable or net-fer-prefit nonprofit organization for free distribution, is immune from civil liability arising from injury, illness or death due to the condition or content of the food, unless the injury or death is -a direct---result---of---the---gross---negligence/--recklessness---or intentional--misconduct--of--the--donor. For purposes of this subsection, "open-dated food" means food that is labeled with a date by which it is recommended that the food be purchased or consumed.
- 3. Immunity of distributor. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a bona fide charitable or net-fer-prefit nonprofit organization and or any employee or volunteer of that organization who in good faith receive receives and distribute 24 distributes food, -- which that is apparently fit for human consumption at the time it is distributed, without charge, are is immune from civil liability arising from an injury, illness or death due to the condition or content of the food, -unless-the 28 injury-or-death-is-a-direct-result-of-the-gross-negligence, recklessness-or-intentional-misconduct-of-the-organization.
