**An Act to Provide for the Annual Apportionment of the Kennebec  
Sanitary Treatment District's Operation Costs on a 3-year Average.**

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

2  
4 Sec. 1. P&SL 1971, c. 45, §16, sub-§2, 3rd sentence, as amended by  
P&SL 1991, c. 7, §9, is further amended to read:

6 When those facilities have been in operation for a 3 fiscal year  
8 years, the apportionment of operating costs thereafter must be  
based on the measured flow of waste-water wastewater and sewerage  
10 entering those facilities during the previous 3 fiscal year years  
12 from each public user after deducting the measured flow of waste  
water wastewater and sewerage from any private user that enters  
the sewerage system of a public user in order to reach the  
district's treatment facilities.

### 16 STATEMENT OF FACT

18 This bill amends the charter of Kennebec Sanitary Treatment  
District to authorize the trustees of the district to apportion  
20 the annual operating costs on a 3-year average rather than on a  
single year's usage.
