Resolve, to Ensure Protection and Family Support for Maine's Children.

(EMERGENCY)

Comme of the comment

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

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Whereas, the State's child protective services system is only able to respond to 25% of the referred cases and does not have adequate resources to offer to those children that do come into the State's custody; and

Whereas, it is essential for the State to make maximum use of federal resources available to support children in need of protection; and

Whereas, it is critical to the health and safety of our children to conduct a comprehensive review of the State's child protective services system and to recommend necessary changes; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Sec. 1. Development of comprehensive plan. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services shall develop a comprehensive plan for protective and family support services for children. In developing this plan, the department shall:

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1. Identify all state, local, public and private agencies involved in the provision of services to children who are abused or neglected;

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2. Determine the extent to which these agencies are currently supported by state and federal dollars and how support might be increased for those services currently provided;

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- 3. Review the protective case loads of the Department of Human Services to determine the extent to which protective services has become a quasi-police function that could be delegated to law enforcement agencies;
- 42 4. Identify how case management resources might be utilized to focus on family support for protective families as opposed to legal intervention;
- 5. Determine how local communities and agencies might become more involved in planning and resource allocation and development and how the State's role in planning, resource development and technical assistance may be increased to support local communities;

- 6. Determine what, if any, statutory, regulatory or policy changes are necessary to allow or support an increased role for local communities and contracted service agencies in the provision of protective services; and
- 7. Determine what, if any, statutory changes are necessary to allow or support maximization of federal funding sources for local expenditures, as well as technical, regulatory or procedural changes in the Department of Human Services that may be necessary to maximize the use of federal resources in support of local programs and services; and be it further

Sec. 2. Establishment of task force; consultation. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services, in developing this comprehensive plan, shall establish and consult with a task force consisting of other appropriate state agencies, local provider agencies involved with children in need of protection and other appropriate groups including but not limited to:

- Maine Sheriff's Association;
- Maine Chiefs of Police Association;
- 3. Maine State Nurses Association;
- 4. Maine Pediatric Surgical Association;
- 5. Maine Superintendents Association;
- 30 6. Maine Municipal Association;
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 7. Child abuse and neglect councils;
- 34 8. Maine mental health associations;
- 9. Parents associations;
- 38 10. Associations of principals and special education directors;
 - 11. Human service provider associations involved with children and families; and
 - 12. Low-income organizations; and be it further
 - Sec. 3. Coordination with Medicaid Plan for Children and Families. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services shall coordinate the development of this comprehensive plan with the implementation of the Medicaid Plan for Children and Families developed pursuant to Resolve 1989, chapter 103. In so doing, the Department of Human Services shall:

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- Determine the implications of the Medicaid Plan for Children and Families for increasing support of other state, local, public and private agencies in the provision of protective services;
 - 2. Identify local dollars that may be available for match under any appropriate federal source; and

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- 3. Identify any state, local or private resources to assist in the maximization of available federal resources; and be it further
- Sec. 4. Staffing; funding. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services shall provide staff within its existing resources to develop the comprehensive plan. The department may also request staff support from the Interdepartmental Council and local child abuse and neglect councils and must seek federal matching funds for existing expenditures for child abuse and neglect councils; and be it further
- Sec. 5. Report. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services shall report every 3 months to the Joint Standing Committee on Education, the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources, the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government and the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs. A work plan and schedule setting forth goals and objectives must be developed within 30 days of the effective date of this Act.
- The department shall submit a final report to the First Regular Session of the 116th Legislature no later than January 15, 1993. The report must outline all of the department's findings and include any necessary implementing legislation. The department shall implement the recommended changes prior to the final report, if possible, and shall defer only those changes that require legislative approval, statutory changes or funding.
- Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This resolve requires the Department of Human Services to develop a comprehensive plan for protective and family support services for children.
