An Act Providing for the Election of Commissioners of the Public Utilities Commission.

Subsequent terms of commissioners are for 6 years in accordance with Title 35-A, section 105-A, subsection 3.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

the 3 commissioners of the Public Utilities Presently, Commission are appointed by the Governor subject to legislative 14 Under this bill those commissioners are elected. The approval. chair of the commission is elected statewide. 16 The other 2 commissioners are elected from the first and 2nd congressional districts. The first election is to be held in November 1994. 18 The terms of elected commissioners are for 6 years, staggered 2 years apart. The terms of the initial commissioners are for 2, 4 $\,$ 20 and 6 years. Terms of the commissioners begin on December 1st 22 after election and end on November 30th of the last year of their terms.

This bill requires that candidates for chair of the commission file, under Maine's election laws, a petition for nomination signed by at least 2,000 and not more than 3,000 voters. A candidate for commissioner other than for chair must submit a petition signed by at least 1,000 and not more than 1,500 voters. In order to promote nonpartisanship in the nomination of candidates for these offices, candidates may not be nominated by party primary elections.

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
