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STATEMENT OF FACT

Under current law, a child must be 6 years of age on October 15th to enroll in grade one. This bill permits a child who is at least 5 years of age on October 15th to enter grade one provided the child is evaluated at parental expense by a psychologist or psychological examiner and meets a number of developmental criteria. The bill permits the school to require and pay for a 2nd evaluation. If the 2nd evaluation confirms the results of the first evaluation, the child may enroll in grade one. If the 2nd evaluation establishes that the child does not meet the developmental criteria, the child may not enroll in grade one.

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
