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## STATEMENT OF FACT

- This amendment replaces the original bill. The original bill required the Department of Human Services to seek federal approval to allow children with mental illness to receive home and community-based care through the Medicaid program if they were at risk of institutionalization. The amendment directs the Department of Human Services to expand the so-called Katie Beckett waiver to include children with mental illness, achieving the bill's original intent for the limited number of children who will qualify for the waiver program.
