An Act to Encourage Good Samaritan Drug and Medical Supply Donations.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
Sec. 1. 14 MRSA §164-A is enacted to read:
§164-A Drug and medical supply donations; immunity from criminal and civil liability
1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the
<u>context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.</u>
A. "Donate" means to give without requiring anything of significant monetary value from the recipient. "Donate" includes giving by a nonprofit organization to another
nonprofit organization when the donor organization has charged a nominal fee to the donee organization, and
distribution by a nonprofit organization to an ultimate recipient who has been required to pay a nominal fee to the nonprofit organization.
B. "Drug" means:
(1) Any article recognized in the official United States pharmacopoeia, the official national formulary
or any supplement to them;
(2) Any article intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention of disease in persons; or
(3) Any article, except food, intended to affect the
structure or function of the human body, but does not mean medical supply as defined in this subsection.
C. "Gross negligence" means voluntary and conscious conduct
by a person who has knowledge at the time of the conduct that the conduct is harmful to the health or well-being of
another person.
D. "Intentional misconduct" means conduct by a person who has knowledge at the time of the conduct that the conduct is
harmful to the health or well-being of another person.
E. "Medical supply" or "medical supplies" means any instrument, apparatus, implement, contrivance, implant, in
vitro reagent or other similar article including any

46	3. Liability for damages from donated drugs or medical supplies. A donor is not subject to any civil or criminal
48	supplies. A donor is not subject to any civil or criminal liability arising from the nature, age, packaging or condition of
±0	drugs or medical supplies that the person donates in good faith

	individuals, except that a donor may be subject to criminal and

	does not meet quality and labeling standards imposed by federal,

	drug or medical supply is not subject to civil or criminal
10	liability when the following requirements are satisfied:
12	A. The donor notifies the nonprofit organization of the
	defective condition of the donated drug or medical supply;

	B. The nonprofit organization agrees to take the necessary
16	measures to comply with all relevant quality standards
	imposed by federal, state and local laws and regulations
18	before distribution of the donated drug or medical supply;

	C. The donor informs the nonprofit organization of the
22	quality standards applicable to the donated drug or medical
_	supply under federal, state and local laws and regulations.

26	STATEMENT OF FACT
28	This bill provides immunity from criminal and civil
	liability to a person who in good faith donates drugs or medical
30	supplies to a nonprofit organization for distribution to needy
	individuals. A donor who is guilty of gross negligence or
32	intentional misconduct is not immune from criminal and civil
	liability.
