2	Sec. 1. 17 MRSA §311, sub-§8, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 197,

6 .	8. Winner-take-all round. "Winner-take-all round" means a beano game or series of beano games in which all the proceeds
8	from-the-sale-of-the-cards-for-that-round are paid-to participants-as-prizes-during-that-round distributed as provided

14	9. Unlimited paper game. "Unlimited paper game" means a game for which there is no limit on total prizes that may be

Notwithstanding any rules to the contrary, the following general rules of operation apply to beano and bingo.
1. Equipment. In addition to standard numbered beano tally
cards, paper cards printed on 2-part carbonless forms, known as
<u>"u-pick-ems" may be used. A participant using "u-pick-ems" shall</u> mark any number from one to 75 in spaces or squares on various
patterns printed on the forms.
2. Nonsmoking area. A nonsmoking area may be set up in
another room or outdoor area separate from the area where the operator is calling numbers if that other room or area has:
A. A master board;
B. A public address system; and
C. A licensed worker present at all times during the game.
3. Calling numbers. When a monitor is used, a ball does
not have to remain within the blower or cage until called, but
may be placed so that a camera shows the number. That number is not in play until called by the operator.

4. Operator location. The operator calling the numbers need not be seated on the same floor level as participants.
