## An Act to Reestablish the Maine Committee on Aging.

2. Appointment; specific qualifications. Members	<u>of the</u>

A. The Governor shall appoint 13 members who are	current
leaders of the State's elderly from a number of field

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representative of the executive branch of State Government may not be a member of the committee.

D. No member of the committee or staff member or volunteer employed by the committee may have a conflict of interest as prohibited by the amended federal 1987 Older Americans Act, 42 United States Code, Section 3027(a)(12)(F)(i, ii and iii).

E. The Director of the Bureau of Elder and Adult Services or the director's designee shall serve as a liaison between the bureau and the committee.

 3. Terms and reappointments. Legislative members serve
during their legislative terms. The other members are appointed for terms of 3 years. Members may be reappointed, but no member
may serve more than 2 consecutive full terms of 3 years each. Members may serve after the expiration of their terms until their
successors have been appointed and gualified.

20 The Governor may terminate the appointment of any member of the committee appointed by the Governor for just cause and the reason for the termination of each appointment must be communicated to each member terminated. The appointment of any member of the committee must be terminated if a member is absent from 3 consecutive meetings without just cause that is communicated to the chair.

4. Vacancies. Any member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the term for which that
member's predecessor was appointed may be appointed only for the remainder of that term.

Any vacancy in the committee does not affect its powers, but must 34 be filled in the same manner in which the original appointment was made.

5. Chair: number of meetings. The Governor shall designate the chair for a term of 2 years from among the members appointed to the committee. The chair may be reappointed by the Governor. The committee shall meet at the call of the chair, but not less often than 4 times a year.

#### <u>§5112-B. Administrative authority</u>

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The committee shall keep minutes of all meetings, including a list of people in attendance. Minutes of all meetings must be sent forthwith to the Governor and leadership of the Legislature.

The committee is authorized to employ, subject to the Civil 50 Service Law, such staff as is necessary to carry out its

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objectives. The committee is authorized to employ consultants and contract for such projects as it determines necessary. The commissioner and the director, to the extent feasible and reasonable, shall make available to the committee such staff, facilities, equipment, supplies, information and other assistance as it may reasonably require to carry out its activities. б

Each member of the committee is entitled to compensation according to the provisions of Title 5, chapter 379. The committee is authorized to appoint subcommittees consisting of its own members and to allow quests of the committee to attend any and all meetings.

A majority of the committee members constitutes a quorum for 14 the purpose of conducting the business of the committee and 16 exercising all the powers of the committee. A vote of the majority of the members present is sufficient for all actions of 18 the committee.

§5112-C. Powers and duties 20

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### The committee has the power and duty to:

1. Advise, consult and assist. Advise, consult and assist 24 the executive and legislative branches of State Government, especially the Governor, on activities of State Government 26 related to older people. The committee is solely advisory in nature. The committee may make recommendations regarding any 28 function intended to benefit older people. If findings, comments 30 or recommendations of the committee vary from or are in addition to those of any state bureau or department, these statements of the committee must be sent to the respective branches of State 32 Government as attachments to those submitted by that bureau or 34 department. Recommendations may take the form of proposed budgetary, legislative or policy actions;

2. Advocate. Serve as an advocate on behalf of older people promoting and assisting activities designed to enhance at the national, state and community levels the well-being of older people. The committee shall serve as an ombudsman on behalf of individual citizens and older people as a class in matters under the jurisdiction of State Government. It shall serve as a voice on behalf of older people to officers of State Government, the Governor, the Legislature, the public-at-large and the Federal Government.

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complaints concerning those facilities. In addition, the 2 committee shall investigate complaints received on behalf of individuals receiving long-term care services provided by the 4 home-based care programs, Medicaid waiver program, licensed home health agencies, certified homemaker agencies and licensed adult 6 day care agencies. To carry out this function, any committee member, staff or volunteer authorized by the committee may enter 8 onto the premises of any adult foster care facility, any boarding care facility or any nursing home during the course of an 10 investigation, speak privately with any individual in the facility or home who consents to the conversation and inspect and 12 copy all records pertaining to a resident as long as the resident or the legal representative of the resident consents in writing 14 to that inspection. The consent, when required and not obtainable in writing, may be conveyed orally or otherwise to the 16 staff of the facility or home. When a resident is not competent to grant consent and has no legal representative, the committee 18 may inspect the resident's records and may make copies that do not contain personally identifiable material without the written 20 consent of a duly appointed legal representative. The committee may authorize up to 25 persons, in addition to committee members and staff of the committee, to carry out this function. 22 Appropriate identification must be issued to all such persons. 24 In accordance with the federal 1987 Older Americans Act, 42 United States Code, as amended, a person may not serve as an 26 ombudsman without training by committee staff as to the rights and responsibilities of an ombudsman or without a specific plan 28 of action under direction of committee staff. The committee shall renew the authorization and issue identification annually. 30 The findings of the committee must be available to the public upon request.

In addition, the committee, staff and volunteers shall visit, 34 talk with and make personal, social and legal services available to residents; inform residents of their rights, entitlements and 36 obligations under federal and state laws by distributing educational materials and meeting with groups or individuals; 38 assist residents in asserting their legal rights regarding claims for public assistance, medical care and social security benefits 40 or in actions against agencies responsible for those programs, as well as in all other matters in which residents are aggrieved, 42 including, but not limited to, advising residents to litigate; and investigate complaints received from residents or concerned 44 parties regarding the care or other matters concerning residents.

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Information or records maintained by the committee concerning complaints may not be disclosed unless the ombudsman authorizes the disclosure. The ombudsman may not disclose the identity of any complainant or resident unless the complainant, the resident

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or a legal representative of either consents in writing to the disclosure; or a court orders the disclosure.

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A complainant, a resident or a legal representative of either, in providing the consent, may specify to whom that identity may be disclosed and for what purposes, in which event no other disclosure is authorized.

Any person, official or institution who in good faith 10 participates in the registering of a complaint pursuant to this subsection, or in good faith investigates that complaint or provides access to those persons carrying out the investigation 12 about an act or practice in any boarding care facility licensed 14 according to section 5154 or 7801 or any nursing home licensed according to section 1817 or who participates in a judicial 16 proceeding resulting from that complaint is immune from any civil or criminal liability that otherwise might result from these 1.8 actions. For the purpose of any civil or criminal proceedings, there is a rebuttable presumption that any person acting pursuant 20 to this subsection did so in good faith;

 3. Advisory committee. Serve as the advisory committee on behalf of the elderly of the State to state agencies pertinent to
or as may be required by state or federal laws and their successors, including, but not limited to:

A. The Priority Social Services Act of 1973 including only coordinated elderly programs, meals for older people and transportation for the elderly;

B. The Maine Residents Property Tax Program;

C. The laws governing the Maine State Housing Authority;

D. The federal 1987 Older Americans Act, 42 United States 36 Code; and

E. The United States Social Security Act, Title IV or Title VI, as amended, as it relates to older people.

The committee shall advise regarding state and federal plans, policies, programs and other activities relating to the older people of the State. The committee shall submit to the federal or state agencies its recommendations and comments on the state plan and any revisions thereof or other pertinent reports. Statements at variance with or in addition to those of the Bureau of Elder and Adult Services or the department reports must be attached to the plan or reports upon submission by the bureau to agencies of the United States Government or to state agencies;

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2 4. Review committee. Authorize a subcommittee, consisting of 5 persons, appointed by the chair to be responsible for analysis of proposals and submission of advisory recommendations 4 to the Director of Elder and Adult Services concerning the acceptability of proposals requesting award of state-administered 6 grant funds under subsection 3, paragraphs A and D. In order to ensure coordination and prevent duplication of services, the 8 committee shall review and comment on, under its own initiative or at the request of any state or federal department or agency, 10 any proposed agreement from any agency or organization within the State to a state or federal department or agency for assistance 12 related to meeting the needs of older persons;

5. Review and evaluation. Review and evaluate, on a continuing basis in consultation with the appropriate state agency, state and federal policies regarding the elderly of the State and programs and other activities affecting the elderly conducted or assisted by any state departments or agencies to determine the value of and impact of those programs or activities on the elderly of the State;

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6. Inform the public. In consultation with the Bureau of 24 Elder and Adult Services, inform the public so as to develop a firm public understanding of the current status of the survival 26 of Maine's elderly, including information on effective programs elsewhere in the State or nation, by collecting and disseminating 28 information, conducting or commissioning studies and publishing the results of the studies and by issuing publications and 30 reports for which a reasonable fee may be charged. The committee may expend from a dedicated revenue account, upon allocation by the Legislature, all collections and fee payments in carrying out 32 the purposes of this section;

7. Public forums. Provide and sponsor public forums, public hearings, conferences, workshops and other meetings to obtain information about, discuss or publicize the needs and solutions to problems of older people. The committee shall hold 38 a statewide Blaine House Conference on Aging at least every 2 40 years and may hold regional conferences and meetings; and

42 8. Administration. Administer in accordance with current fiscal and accounting regulations of the State, and in accordance with the philosophy, objectives and authority of this Part, any 44 funds appropriated for expenditure by the committee or any grants 46 or gifts may become available, accepted and received by the committee; and make an annual report, which must be submitted directly to the director, commissioner, Governor and Legislature 48 not later than September 1st of each year, concerning its work, recommendations and interests of the previous fiscal year and 50
