L	Sec. 1. 1 MRSA §1012, sub-§4, as enacted by PL 1989, c. 561,
4	§4, is amended to read:
6	4. Gift. "Gift" means anything of value, including forgiveness of an obligation or debt, given to a person without
8	that person providing equal or greater consideration to the
10	giver. "Gift" does not include:
12	A. Gifts received from a single source during the reporting period with an aggregate value of \$300 or less;
14	B. A bequest or other form of inheritance; and
16	C. A gift received from a relativer; or
18	D. A meal with a value no greater than \$25 per person that is provided in conjunction with an informational program
20	sponsored by an industry or special interest organization for a group of legislators.

26	3. Gifts and pecuniary benefits to public servants. A person may not provide a meal without charge to a public servant
28	unless the following conditions are met:
30	A. Each meal has a value no greater than \$25 per person;
32	B. The meal is provided in conjunction with an informational program; and

STATEMENT OF FACT.

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This bill excludes from improper gifts and pecuniary benefits to public servants meals that are worth no more than \$25 per person and are provided to a group of public servants as part of an informational program sponsored by industry or special

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interest organizations.

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
