2	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §610 is enacted to read:
4	\$610. Maine Parks and Recreation Fund

8 .	1. Fund established. The Maine Parks and Recreation Fund, referred to in this section as the "fund," is established as a nonlapsing fund administered by the commissioner for the purpose
10	of improving existing state parks and acquiring additional state and municipal lands for public use. The money deposited with the
12	Treasurer of State to the credit of the fund may be invested as provided by law. Interest on these investments is credited to
14	the fund.
16 18	2. Fund source. The fund receives money from the revenues collected by the Maine Turnpike Authority pursuant to the provisions of Title 23, section 1973, subsection 4-A.
20	3. Purposes. Money in the fund must be used in the following proportions and for the following purposes:
22	A. One-third for capital expenditures in existing state
24	parks to be administered by the bureau;
26	B. One-third for public land acquisition, to be administered by the Land for Maine's Future Board; and

30	C. One-third for a municipal grants program that will enable municipalities to acquire municipal parks and open space. The municipal grants program must be administered by
32	the bureau.

36	4-A. Toll surcharge. The authority shall charge a 10¢ surcharge on every trip made on the turnpike from May 15th to
38	November 15th of each year. The surcharge may not be levied on
40	fares charged commuters under the discount system established under subsection 4, paragraph A. Revenues from this surcharge must be transferred to the Maine Parks and Recreation Fund as
42	authorized by Title 12, section 610. The authority must be reimbursed for administrative costs incurred in collecting and

20	STATEMENT OF FACT
22	This bill establishes the Maine Parks and Recreation Fund, which is a nonlapsing dedicated account. This account is funded
24	by a 10¢ surcharge levied on trips made on the Maine Turnpike from May 15th to November 15th of each year. The surcharge will
26	not be levied on those using commuter passes. This funding mechanism links the frequent use of the Maine Turnpike by
28	tourists with the financial burdens of providing state and municipal park facilities which are often used by tourists during
30	this time period.
32	This fund is to be used for 3 specific purposes: One-third will go to the Department of Conservation, Bureau of Parks and
34	Recreation to provide funding for capital expenditures; 1/3 will

will go to the Department of Conservation, Bureau of Parks and Recreation to provide funding for capital expenditures; 1/3 will go to the Land for Maine's Future Board to acquire public lands; and 1/3 will be used to establish a municipal grants program, which will be administered by the Bureau of Parks and Recreation. This municipal grants program will provide municipalities with funding to acquire municipal parks and open space.

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
