2	Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after
4	adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
*	Whereas, most prison inmates are undereducated when compared
6	to the general population; and
8	Whereas, there is a correlation between education and
	positive life experiences, and some studies show a correlation
10	between more prison education and lower recidivism; and
12	Whereas, state prison programs have been severely affected
	by budget cuts and the education program at the State's prisons
14	has a below-average participation rate; and
16	Whereas, there are a number of innovative programs being
	utilized or studied in other states; and
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20	Whereas, it is essential to complete a study of inmate education and training by the beginning of the next session of

18	Sec. 5. Reporting requirements. Resolved: That the commission present a written report of its recommendations together with any
20	implementing legislation to the Executive Director of the Legislative Council and to the Joint Select Committee on
22	Corrections by January 1, 1994 and make a verbal presentation to that committee by February 1, 1994. The commission must
24	prioritize its recommendations and provide estimated costs for implementation of those recommendations. The commission shall
26	take into account the financial situation of State Government in making its recommendations.

42	correctional facilities and make recommendations to the Legislature concerning those recommendations.
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
