An Act to Encourage the Implementation of the Solid Waste Management Hierarchy.

Presented by Representative SAXL of Bangor. Cosponsored by Representatives: COLES of Harpswell, CROSS of Dover-Foxcroft, GOULD of Greenville, HOLT of Bath, Senator: BALDACCI of Penobscot. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 1. 38 MRSA \$1303-C, sub-\$29, as amended by PL 1989, c. 869, Pt. A, \$5 and affected by \$21, is further amended to read:

29. Solid waste. "Solid waste" means useless, unwanted or discarded solid material with insufficient liquid content to be free-flowing, including, but not limited to, rubbish, garbage, refuse-derived fuel, scrap materials, junk, refuse, inert fill material and landscape refuse, <u>sewage treatment plant sludge</u>, but does not include hazardous waste, biomedical waste, septic tank sludge or agricultural wastes. The fact that a solid waste or constituent of the waste may have value or other use or may be sold or exchanged does not exclude it from this definition.

Sec. 2. 38 MRSA §2132, sub-§3, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 492, §3, is amended to read:

3. Beneficial use of waste. Composting, land application, processing to reduce volume, incineration and other uses higher 20 on the solid waste management hierarchy of solid waste that otherwise would be landfilled constitute partial recycling in 22 determining whether the goals in subsection 1 are being met. The 24 agency shall adopt, by rule, a percentage recycling credit for each method of solid waste management according to its relative effect in reducing the utilization of landfill space, the 26 avoidance of raw natural material utilization and the extent to which a higher position on the waste management hierarchy is 28 achieved. The use of waste paper or corrugated cardboard as a fuel in industrial boilers for the generation of heat, steam or 30 electricity constitutes recycling for the sole purpose of determining whether the goals in subsection 1 are met and if the 32 wastes would otherwise be placed in a landfill, if the office 34 determines that there is no reasonably available market in the State for recycling that waste and if the wastes are incinerated as a substitute for, or supplement to, fossil or biomass fuels 36 that constitute the primary fuels incinerated in the industrial boiler. 38
